Consequently, the Memorial Book Comeld meetings — at first several times a year nged various events for the purpose of raising s required for the publication of this volume iltaneously to provide an opportunity for our townspeople who lived in the huge city of ork to meet socially and spend an occasional together in an intimately friendly atmosphere. hose events were New Year parties, Chanukkah ons, Purim balls, and the like. Moreover, every ecial meeting was held which memorialized the on of our birthplace, and afforded our townspeople a fitting opportunity of recalling the memory of their loved ones who had perished in the years of agony and annihilation, while at the same time they responded during the meeting to the appeal for contributions to the fund needed for the publication of this volume.

Fifteen years passed thus. During this period a considerable number of our American countrymen visited Israel, never forgetting to encourage and help the committee there and to demand most urgently that the time for the actual final publication be expedited. It goes without saying that the Wloclawek Memorial Book Committee itself made a substantial contribution to the budget needed for the book, and also brought their influence to bear upon other countrymen residing in Canada, Belgium, France and England, urging them to make their contributions as well toward the successful completion of the project.

Most active during all these years in the efforts on behalf of the book and of other undertakings of the New York committee were M.D. Alter and Stanley B. Mirels who together with the undesigned devoted untold patience and energy to this difficult task, absorbing

along the way various barbs of criticism.

Publication of the American volume was also delayed because of the resolution passed at the last general meeting expressing the wish that to the Hebrew-Yiddish edition of the Memorial Book be added also a special English edition which would consist of a condensed summary of the most important portions and incorporate certain details which had been omitted in the original text. The English portion is intended for those who unfortunately do not have a command of our own Jewish tongues, so that they too may become acquainted with the history, development and ultimate destruction of our birthplace in Poland. We had in mind particularly the growing generation of children and grandchildren. Under the circumstances that prevailed, we did our utmost. The editor — who also had a large share in the Yiddish-Hebrew section of the book — did his work with infinite love and devotion, aided by the unfailing understanding and cooperation of the above-mentioned friends on the committee.

We hope that this book will find its way into the homes of our townspeople and that in moments of nostalgia they will, with trembling hands and a sense of respect and awe, turn the pages of this volume which is in effect the sole memorial to the beloved Jewish kehillah that once existed — and is no more.
