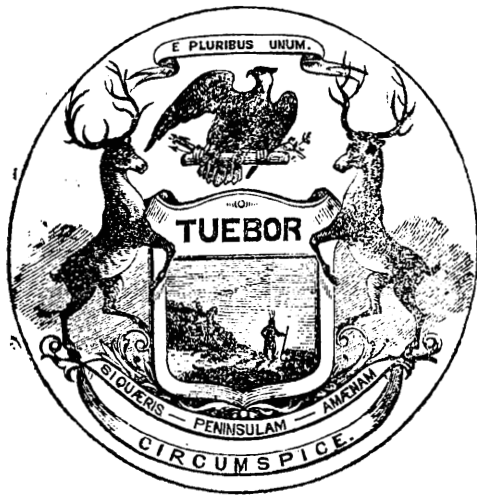

The Directory.

NUMBERING THE CITY !!

The general wish of the Citizens of Detroit, it is hoped will not be left, unheeded by the Common Council, that the Ordinance relative to Numbering the Houses, will be enforced by the Marshal or some person specially appointed for such purpose. It should be remembered that every twenty feet front makes a number. It is also important that all persons moving frame buildings should not fail to take off their numbers.

POST OFFICE DELIVERY OF LETTERS, &c.

Our excellent Postmaster, Col. Brodhead, would promote the convenience of many thousands of our hard working mechanics who do not rent boxes, and upon whose time the tax of being under the necessity of going to the Post Office both with, and for letters is greatly felt, if Receiving and Delivery offices were established by him at or near the following places in the city:

Corner Fort Gratiot and Rivard street

Corner Michigan Avenue and Seventh street

Corner George street and Woodward Avenue.

It would seem to be a most desired object to establish the system of "LETTER CARRYING." The compiler knows this to be the prevailing and indeed almost universal wish of the citizens of Detroit.

THE WOOL OF MICHIGAN !!

It is hoped the Board of Trade will obtain Statistics of the quantity Shorn and Exported. The whole crop is annually shipped East; and thence probably shipped to England. There are two or three miserable attempts to manufacture in the State—the seemingly most successful at Kalamazoo. It is not attempted throughout the State to manufacture cloths of a fine texture. A manufactory established in Detroit could maintain one thousand hands profitably, if looms were but once well started.

P R E F A C E .

It cannot be otherwise than highly gratifying to all connected with Detroit, to notice the almost marvelously rapid annual increase of her population. That "population is wealth" is an axiom requiring no elucidation, but producing the conviction of its truthful fact to the mind of every man of common sense. The paradoxical ethics of a Martineau or Malthus can never have weight in an American community until our almost boundless and fertile prairies are partitioned into allotments disproportioned to the wants of mankind, as is the case with the agricultural peoples of the old world. There the possession of the same number of acres which are conveyed here by a grant of the government to a meritorious private soldier—namely, one hundred and sixty acres—constitutes a conventional or class title to its fortunate possessor to "lord it" over the less fortunate but more industrial classes of men who surround his privileged inheritance. And for the maintenance and protection of this proprietary class, all European legislation seems to have a tendency. In fact, this proprietary class almost exclusively, are the framers and makers of the laws, if an exception be admitted in favor of incorporated boroughs such as an American would understand by the term "the incorporated limits of Detroit," or any such city with the power of local governing jurisdiction.

Happy are the people of America who own so many broad acres and have so many millions to offer the pent-up peoples of the old world at prices little more to be regarded than their acceptance as a gift.

The solid moral and political philosophy of Paley, seems to be still more suited to America than to England, when he says that "*in the ordinary progress of human affairs, whatever, in any way, contributes to make a people happier, tends to render them more numerous.*"

Here is an incontrovertable moral lesson worthy of due consideration, and the contrary experience of a commonwealth necessarily presents sterility and depletion of industry and resources.

The Compiler of this Directory is proud in having been permitted to witness the growth of Detroit since 1850, then a population of little over 20,000, expand itself within six years to more than treble that amount.

It is presumable that from measures employed by the State Executive, the population spread over the vast Peninsula of Michigan is gaining in proportion. Certainly there is nothing to prevent large additions by annual immigration, but the indifference of the governing power, for the time, to the promotion of such a laudable and highly patriotic project. The trade interests of Detroit should demand, if from no other object than merely local benefit, that three or four discreet and efficient Emigrant Agents be appointed to spheres from which could be readily drawn meritorious artisans and agriculturists who need the philanthropic guidance of friends, from their present fields of unprofitable labor.

The return to Detroit of men of judgment and enlarged experience, from California and elsewhere, affords very decided proof of the superior advantages offered by Michi-

gan to settlers on its fertile lands. This allusion leads me to introduce an extract from an able statistical Tract on the subject of the THE IRON RESOURCES OF MICHIGAN, written by MORGAN L. BATES, Esq., and which will be found on pages 341 to 347.

The reader will please pass no severe judgements on the Directory, which like all works of the kind, is the result of arduous labor, no matter with what amount of competency the compiler may be facilitated, until he will have examined its Index and made reference to all its parts.

Something is generally expected to be written by way of preface to a book. The compiler acquits himself of such expected duty, but should not have fully discharged it without assuring his Detroit friends how sincerely grateful he feels for the support he has from time to time received in the efforts he has made to be useful to his fellow citizens, in endeavoring to prepare them a cheap annual assistant at their desks and counters ; and, as no clerk or assistant of any kind, may be expected without some development of error, he pleads for the errors of the Directory generous extenuation.

MICHIGAN MARINE HOSPITAL.

This Superb Home for old and disabled seamen is at present in progress of erection on a lot of ground comprising eight acres, situated just above the city, Messrs. I. W. Ingersoll and Joseph Grainger are the contractors for the building, and the general superintendency of its erection has been entrusted by the Government to William Barclay. The ground cost \$23,000. The building is estimated to cost \$100,000. It is to be fire proof; all the floors are to be arched, the joists are to be of iron, as also the roof. The building is to be enclosed with an ornamental iron verandah.

STATISTICS OF CATHOLIC SOCIETIES, SCHOOLS, &c.

The following statistical notices of the Catholic Schools of Detroit, &c., are supplied by Dr. HASSETT.

Sisters of Notre Dame.

These Sisters have charge of the female department in the school attached to St. Mary's church. Number of Scholars, 180. Those Ladies have also under their charge an Orphan Asylum for girls of St. Mary's congregation, in which there are now 35 orphans.

St. Vincent's Select School for Girls, and Female Orphan Asylum.

This school is conducted by the Sisters of the community at Emmittsburg. In this school all the branches of a plain and useful education are taught, and the moral and the religious education of the scholars is particularly attended to. In addition, these Sisters have under their charge an Orphan Asylum for girls, in which there are 75 orphan children, and they also teach another school for poor children, numbering 250 scholars. Instruction is attended to on every Wednesday afternoon, and one hour before high mass on Sundays, and also one hour before vespers. Sister Mary Lucretia, Sr. Servant.

St. Mary's Hospital.

The Sisters of Charity extend also their benevolence to the sufferers of afflicted hu-

manity, and keep an asylum under the name and style of St. Mary's Hospital, where numbers of patients are daily receiving spiritual and corporeal advantages of their benevolence. The building is built of brick, three and a half stories high, besides the basement, and measures 87 feet in length by 54 in breadth. It is an eligible location, with spacious ground attached to it, and has ample accommodations for over one hundred patients. Sister Mary De Sales, Sister Servant. Rev. John H. De Bolle, Chaplain.

Ladies of The Sacred Heart.

This institution combines, in its plan of education, together with the benefits of christian instruction, every advantage that can be derived from a punctual and conscientious care bestowed upon the pupils, in every branch of science suitable to their sex. The strictest attention is given to form as well the manners as the principles of the young ladies, and to train them up to habits of order, neatness and industry.

The health of the pupils is the object of constant solicitude. In sickness, they are affectionately attended to; and they are at all times under the immediate superintendence of the ladies.

Brothers of the Christian Schools.

There are at present nine Brothers in Detroit who attend four schools in the basement of St. Anne's, where 350 children receive daily instruction; and also two schools attached to St. Mary's church, where there are 264 scholars. Bro. Albien, Director.

Catholic Guild of Detroit.

This association was established in July, 1850, and is under the patronage of SS. Peter and Paul, Apostles. It is governed by a Chaplain, appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese, a Warden, Bursar, Sub-bursar, Secretary and Council. The Guild is in a most flourishing condition, and produces both in a spiritual and temporal point of view, all the advantages which were expected from it. It possesses 160 members.— With it is connected a *Juvenile Guild*, under the patronage of the Holy Family, having its separate constitution and officers, for youths from 12 to 20 years of age; at which age, if in good standing, they can pass into the Senior Guild, and there immediately and without any other formality be invested as regular members.

It has been said with truth, that where you find fine Churches, there you find a thriving city. This is particularly true with regard to Detroit. No city in America can boast of churches which can surpass our own in the beauty of their architecture, style and execution. They are the admiration of all who behold them; and the stranger who visits us for the first time is impressed with the belief that the prosperity of Detroit is as infallible as are the solid foundations of its beautiful churches.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, situated on the corner of Congress and Shelby streets, was finished in Dec. 1852. It is a fine specimen of Early English Gothic Architecture, built of stone, having Tower and Spire on the S. W. angle, extending to the height of 175 feet. The Mariner's Church, also Episcopalian, situated on the corner of Woodward ave. and Woodbridge street, is of stone also, and built in the castellated Gothic style.

The Fort street Presbyterian Church, situated on the corner of Fort and Third streets, is also of stone, built in the early decorated style of Gothic Architecture—having Tower and Spire in the N. W. corner, rising to the height of 225 feet: Lantern Tower on the N. E. corner, 95 feet high, and a square tower over the front gable. The Pinnacles, Tracery and detail throughout are all of stone; and the building itself is a complete triumph of the art of Architecture. It is built from the design of A. H. JORDAN, Esq., of Detroit, and was completed in 1855.

The Jefferson Ave. Presbyterian Church is of brick, and will be finished with mastic, in imitation of free stone; is built in the perpendicular style of Gothic Architecture. The interior of this Church has been greatly admired by all who have seen it. The ceiling is groined; the Arches of Aisles and Naves springing from clustered columns have plated capitals. The ceilings are interlaced with rich tracery, having heavily foliated bosses on the intersections of the mouldings. The walls of nave are pierced with triplet windows, lighted from skylights in the roof, producing a rich and pleasing effect. The exterior when completed, will correspond with the interior. This building was erected in 1855, and is also from the designs of A. H. JORDAN, Esq.

The Presbyterian Church, situated on the corner of State and Farmer streets, is in the Roman style of Architecture: it has a Tower and Spire rising to the height of 235 feet on the S. W. corner, and a smaller tower on the S. E. corner. The windows are circular throughout; the roof finished with a heavy projecting cornice; the walls divided by pilasters into panels. The interior is very rich in design and finish. The arrangement of the Pulpit, and finish of the Organ front, are quite novel and pleasing. This building is also from the design of A. H. JORDAN, Esq., and was completed in 1855.

The Congregational Church on Fort street, is also Roman, and is a fine specimen of that style of Architecture. It is entirely finished in imitation of brown free stone. The Tower and Spire are 210 feet high. The interior finishing is very elaborate. The ceiling is deeply pannelled and heavily enriched. The coloring is soft, pleasing and very harmonious. It was dedicated in 1854, and built from the design of A. H. JORDAN, Esq.

The Unitarian Church on Lafayette street, erected in 1853 from the design of Messrs. Lum & Ford, is a very beautiful specimen of Grecian Architecture. The columns of the portico are fluted and have Ionic capitals. The interior is well arranged, and the finish in exceeding good taste.

The Methodist Churches on Woodward Ave. and on Randolph street, and the Baptist Church on Fort street, are also fine and handsome structures. The Catholic Cathedral on Jefferson Ave., is a large structure in the Roman style, at present unfinished. St. Ann's Church, (Catholic,) in Larned street is the oldest house of worship in Detroit.

There is also a new Catholic Church at present in course of construction in the Eighth Ward, which will be a good commodious building when completed. There are numerous other Churches throughout the city, having no especial claims to notice for architectural beauty.

The Building consists of a centre and six wings. It has a front of 700 feet, and with the two end wings, which are at right angles with the others, has an entire length of about 1,000 feet—the whole being designed to accommodate 250 patients. The building is fire-proof, and embraces many improvements from experiences of other similar establishments. The style adopted for the architectural details is Italian. It is plain, but unique in character, and sufficiently relieved by agreeable detail to please the eye and excite cheerful sentiments. The site is about one mile removed from the handsome city of Kalamazoo, about midway between Detroit and Chicago. The Asylum ground includes 176 acres, suitably timbered, of a picturesque character, and desirably diversified with a rapid stream of water. The Asylum is to be lighted with gas, manufactured on the premises in a detached building.

The cost of the Building and furnishing approaches \$250,000. The salary of the

Superintendent is rated at \$2,000 per annum, which seems moderate for services so onerous, and demanding comprehensive experience and superior ability in their successful discharge.

The late census of the State reveals the existence of 426 insane persons within its limits. There are reasons for believing the number exceeds that amount.

The late census of Michigan reveals the unhappy fact that there are 206 Deaf and Dumb, and 176 Blind persons within the State. The actual number is supposed not to have been fully ascertained.

The Building, which is still in progress of erection, when finished is expected to accommodate from 300 to 350 pupils. It covers 200 feet in width by 240 in depth, and is 56 high. The cost is estimated at \$100,000.

Its location is pleasantly situated, adjoining the thriving city of Flint, in the county of Genesee, through which will pass the Port Huron and Lake Michigan Railroad, and is approached by the Detroit and Milwaukee Railroad.

The Institution is in operation under the superintendence of Mr. and Mrs. Fay, since February, 1854, when, in a building temporarily provided at that time, the work of instruction was commenced. A very valuable report from the Principal will be found appended to the Report of the Trustees to the State Legislature. It appears that from the 6th February to the 9th December, 1854, there were received,

This establishment is located at Jackson, a popular and busy central town in the county of Jackson, 75 miles from Detroit on the line of the Michigan Central Railway, and about 32 miles from the Capital.

Extensive manufactures are carried on within the Prison by capitalists who hire the labor of the prisoners from the State. The various branches of manufacturing would properly appear under the heads of *advertising*.

The Prison building is plain and somewhat time worn, notwithstanding recent improvements and additions, and must, before many years, give place to a new and substantial edifice, and one more ornamental to Jackson.

Juvenile Penitentiary.

Located at Lansing, 110 miles N. W. from Detroit.

CAPITAL OF MICHIGAN.

The Houses of the Legislature, and the officers of the State Departments are established at Lansing, in the county of Ingham, 110 miles North-west from Detroit. Population 2,500.

There are daily mail Stage Coaches to Lansing from Detroit. Office at Andrew's, Railroad Hotel.

This site was selected in the year 1847, by the Legislature as the most central point at which to erect the Capitol. It is now an interesting and inviting village for business settlement, surrounded as it is by a good farming country.

Detroit is the capital of Michigan—regarded numerically as respects population—commercially, as respects its great centralized trade, and from its inevitably secure, and unrivaled privileges of transport in direct inter-communication with the seaboard by land and water.

The Juvenile Penitentiary is located here, and within a radius of ten miles a State Agricultural College, upon a model farm of 677 acres,

These Schools are periodically examined by the Board of School Inspectors. There are numerous other Schools throughout the city, which are generally called "private" and "select" but they are much too many to obtain in the Directory and Gazetteer of Michigan, special notice, except in the form of a paid advertisement.

The system of State instruction seems to be fully and generally appreciated. Not only in Detroit, but throughout the remote Townships of the State.

The average number of Pupils in attendance during School terms is nearly 3,000—and it is estimated that 5,000 children receive instruction at the Public Schools within the year.

The public are informed of the commencement of terms, as well as of vacations, through the medium of the daily newspapers.

According to the last census returns, there are 186,952 children attending schools in this State. The amount of mill tax school fund for the State is this year \$99,640 42. This return does not include all the children—as some School Districts have not been correctly reported.

If the number of scholars in Seminaries, Colleges and Normal schools be added to the above, it will not fall short of *two hundred and fifty thousand* children now attending schools. No better proof of the intelligence of the masses, or the successful operations of our State system of education.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF DETROIT,

OFFICE OF THE CITY COMPTROLLER,

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Detroit :

Section 44 of the act amending the charter of the City of Detroit, approved April 4th, 1827, provides as follows:—"That the said Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen shall, once in each year, cause to be published a just and true account of all the moneys which shall have accrued in their corporate capacity, during the year next preceding such publication, and also the disposition thereof."

In compliance with this provision and of the duties imposed on me by the third section of the ordinance relative to the City Comptroller, I beg leave to submit the annexed annual report, exhibiting the receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year commencing March 14th, 1855, and ending on the 1st instant, together with the state of the public debt and the state of the finances of each fund, and such other information in regard to the general finances of the city as the public interest requires.

Statement No. 1 shows that the amount of our funded debt on the 1st inst., was, exclusive of the bonds held by the trustees of the sinking fund,	\$309,436 18

This is an unusually large balance to have in the Treasury at this season of the year, and is caused from the fact that some \$20,000 of the amount appropriated to the construction of sewers the past year, was not expended. There is also an unexpended Alms House appropriation of \$5,000, and by deducting these two sums it would leave the balance about the same as last year.

Statement No. 3 shows the operations of the Sinking Fund which are highly satisfactory.

It is now four years since the sinking fund was established, and we have been enabled by its resources to pay thirty-five thousand dollars of the funded debt of the city—being thirteen thousand dollars more than it was estimated we could do, at this date, when the sinking fund went into operation.

It will be noticed that fifty thousand dollars of our debt will mature May 1st, 1858, and sixty thousand dollars on the 1st of Sept., 1859. It will be impossible for us to meet this large amount without resorting to further loans, but we shall then have reached the turning point in our resources for the liquidation of our funded debt.—There will be no difficulty after 1859 in meeting all our liabilities as they become due,

with the resources of the sinking fund, and it is my confident belief that by the year 1870 we shall be in a condition to call in all our present indebtedness, which shall then be outstanding.

Statement No. 4 shows that we have paid, the past year \$22,530 34 of interest on our funded debt, with a balance on hand of \$9,005 75 to meet the interest due the 1st inst. and falling due in April, May and July next.

It is, perhaps, proper here to state that the interest on the bonds payable in the city of New York is paid by the Ohio Life Insurance and Trust Company, with whom arrangements have been made for that purpose. The bonds maturing the 1st of June next should be presented there also for payment. They are made payable, however, at the Bank of America, in New York.

Statement No. 8 shows the condition of the general road fund. The deficit in this fund was caused by the paving of the upper end of Michigan avenue, for which no estimate had been previously made, and also by paving assessments assessed to the occupants of the seminary lot, but for which, it subsequently appeared, they were not liable. The estimates of last year for paving in front of, and adjacent to, city property, were \$6,537 00, whereas the actual cost of the same amounts to the sum of \$10,365 70 creating a deficit in this item alone of \$3,828 70.

Statement No. 17, of the General Fund : Notwithstanding the very liberal estimates made for this Fund last Spring, it will be perceived that it has failed to meet all the liabilities chargeable to it, there being a deficit of \$2,091 61. This has been caused partly by an increase in the salaries of the City officers, the expenditure of planking the vegetable market, and various other items of expenditures which were not anticipated at the time the estimates were made. Add to this, also, a deficit in the anticipated receipts, arising from the non-payment of stall rents by most of the butchers in the old addition to the City Hall Market, amounting to the sum of \$775. Also, from unpaid stall rents due from butchers in the new market, amounting to \$522 50, and also, from an increase in the return of delinquent taxes. Still, the deficit in this fund may be considered as merely temporary, as most of the amount due for stall rents will soon be paid, and the amount which shall be realized from the tax sale, which will take place soon, will, it is believed, make up the present deficit.

Statement No. 52 shows how the tax of 1855 was appropriated, and also the difference in the amount of taxation as compared with 1854, and showing an increase in one year of \$44,698 71. This was by far a greater increase than was ever before known in any one year, in this city, and was severely felt by the tax-payers.

In the matter of taxation, there should not be such an increase in any one year as to make it a burden upon those who have them to pay. To a gradual and proportionate increase, having due regard to the wants of the public, no community will demur; and it will be my aim, in bringing forward the estimates for the ordinary expenditures of the city government, for the ensuing year, to endeavor to reduce, rather than increase, the amount compared with last year. The best government is that which gives equal protection to all, and consumes, for its own maintenance, the smallest amount of the earnings of its constituents. The tax payers of the city of Detroit pay willingly and liberally for every service rendered by their agents, and they only ask a fair equivalent for the money exacted of them, and this they have a right to demand. The Report of Mr. Peltier is referred to for any further information on the head of City Taxation. Its details present a huge amount of office labor, which is generally performed during almost incessant and unavoidable interruptions from citizens calling on the Comptroller on business of every variety connected with his official position.

There are 58 different Tabular divisions in the Report in question—from which the public are informed that there are now in use 327 gas lamps in Detroit, which have cost the city, during 1855 (including the erection, repairs and painting of a large number of these,) \$5,310 33.

EXTRACT FROM DETROIT CITY LAWS RELATIVE TO HACKNEY COACHES AND CABS.

SEC. 2. Every person to whom a license shall be granted, as provided for in the foregoing section, shall execute a bond, to the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Freemen of the city of Detroit, in the sum of two hundred dollars, with sufficient sureties, to be approved by the City Auditor; conditioned, that such person will pay all fines, costs, penalties or damages, for which he may become liable, on account of the use of any cab, hackney coaches, carriages, omnibusses or other vehicles, kept or used by such person, under his license as aforesaid; and no license shall be of any validity until such bond has been duly executed and filed with the City Clerk.

SEC. 3. The prices which may be charged by the owners or drivers of hackney coaches, cabs, carriages, omnibusses or other vehicles, shall not exceed as follows, viz:— For conveying one person, for each drive, less than one hour, twenty-five cents; for

conveying two or more persons, for each drive less than one hour, twenty-five cents for each person; for the use of a cab, carriage, hackney coach or other vehicle, (except an omnibus,) by the hour, to carry not more than four persons inside, at the rate of one dollar per hour: *Provided*, That children between two and twelve years of age shall be conveyed at one-half the foregoing rates; and infants under two years of age shall be carried free if in charge of any other person.

SEC. 4. When a cab, carriage, hackney coach or other vehicle shall be used for a longer time than one hour, the owner or driver thereof shall be entitled to charge and receive from the person or persons using the same, the sum of one dollar for each full hour the same shall have been used; and for fractional parts of an hour he shall only charge and receive at the rate of one dollar per hour, as aforesaid.

SEC. 5. For each trunk carried on any cab, carriage, hackney coach, omnibus or other vehicle, the owner or driver thereof may charge and receive the sum of twelve and one-half cents, and no more: *Provided*, That each person hiring or using any such carriage, cab, omnibus or other vehicle, shall be allowed to carry thereon an ordinary travelling bag, valise or bundle weighing less than forty-five pounds, free of all charge.

SEC. 6. When a cab, carriage, omnibus, hackney coach or other vehicle shall be hired or used between the hours of eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, the owner or driver thereof shall be entitled to charge and receive one-half more than the rates prescribed in the foregoing section, and no more.

SEC. 7. In no case shall any person or any number of persons less than five, be charged for the use of a cab, carriage, hackney coach or other vehicle, more than the sum allowed for the use thereof for one hour, unless the same shall be used for more than one hour, although the person or persons using the same may have stopped at several places during the time he, she or they may have been using such cab, carriage, hackney coach or other vehicle.

SEC. 8. A fine of not less than twenty five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars and costs of prosecution, shall be imposed by the Mayor's Court upon the owner or driver of any hackney coach, cab, carriage omnibus or other vehicle who shall demand or receive higher or greater prices or rates for the use of his cab, carriage, hackney coach, omnibus or other vehicle, than those named and fixed by the foregoing sections of this ordinance; and a fine of ten dollars and costs of prosecution shall be imposed by the Mayor's Court upon the owner or driver of the foregoing named vehicles, or any other vehicles used for hire in said city, who shall unreasonably refuse or neglect to convey any person or persons within the bounds of said city, when applied to for that purpose, and being at the time employed; and the like fine shall be imposed by said Court upon the owner or driver of either of the foregoing named vehicles, or any other vehicles used for hire in said city, who shall neglect to place upon such vehicle, in a conspicuous place inside, a card on which shall be legibly printed the number of the license under which such vehicle is used, the name of the owner thereof, and the prices or rates fixed by this ordinance for the use of cabs, hackney coaches, carriages, omnibusses and other vehicles.

SEC. 9. All keepers of livery stables within said city shall pay the sum of five dollars to the City Treasurer for every carriage, cab or other vehicle which they may at any time place on a public stand, or run as a public conveyance within said city; and all carriages or other vehicles placed by any livery stable keeper on a public stand, shall be regularly numbered, and subject to all the provisions hereinbefore contained relative to rates or prices of conveyance; and in case any livery stable keeper shall place a carriage or other vehicle on a public stand without paying the said sum of five dollars to the City Treasurer, and placing a number on his carriage or other vehicle, he shall, upon conviction of the offence the Mayor's Court, be fined ten dollars and costs of prosecution.

THE COMMERCE OF THE LAKES.

The preservation in the form of a Summary in the Directory and Gazetteer of such interesting commercial data, it is hoped, will prove useful to the Mercantile community. The following *presci* of facts and figures has been extracted from the Report of the Congressional Committee on the subject of the commerce of the Lakes; and which may have influenced to a great extent the passage of the enactment for the improvement of the navigation of Lake St Clair. The *Detroit Tribune*, from which the article is here extracted, acknowledges it turn from the *Cleveland Herald*.

The clearances of vessels from ports in the U. S. to Canada, and the entries of vessels from Canada to ports in the U. S., during the year 1855, show a greater amount of Tonnage entered and cleared than between the U. S. and any other foreign country.

From the U. S. to Canada there were 2,369 clearances of American vessels, and 6,638 of Canadian, making a total of 9,007. The total tonnage was 1,793,519. The clearances from Canada to the U. S. for the same time were 2,454 American vessels and 4,194 Canadian, making a total of 6,648, with a total Tonnage of 1,767,730, and a total Tonnage back and forth of 3,561,249.

The value of Lake Tonnage for 1854, \$10,185,000; at an average of \$43 per ton, this would make the value of the increased tonnage for 1855, (viz, 345,000 tons,) reach \$14,835,000.

The following table shows the value of the Lake commerce for 1855, excluding the districts of Presque Isle and Mackinac, and not including the freight and passenger trade:—

This sum may seem incredible to those unacquainted with the immense carrying trade of these Lakes. But the figures will show that the trade between the U. S. and Canada, carried on over the Lakes, is in value next to that between France and the U. S. The amount of American goods sent to Canada is \$9,950,764, and the amount of foreign goods, but passing through American hands is \$8,769,280, while the amount of goods sent from Canada to the States is \$12,182,314, making a total trade between the two countries of \$30,902,658.*

The actual value of property exposed to the perils of Lake Navigation is considera-

*These figures are very convincing of the fact that the interests of the Canadas with the United States are one and identical—and the Commercial and social good understanding happily existing between the two Countries leaves no room for hope on the part of the *Oligarchical Mother of Colonies*, that Canada will remain long in servile subordination to a distant Monarchy.—Ed.

bly greater than the *total value* of the merchandise of every description exported from the U. S. to all foreign countries added to the total value of merchandise imported from all foreign countries into the United States.

The dangers to which our Lake Commerce is exposed are three, viz: Shipwreck, Collision and Stranding. These are shown to be in a great measure attributable to the narrow area over which this commerce is carried on, the stormy character of the Lakes, the exposed condition of the Lake Coasts, and the want of natural or artificial harbors of commerce or of refuge for the Lake Shipping.

Thus a vessel sailing from Cape Vincent, Lake Ontario, to Chicago, Lake Michigan, by *keeping the centre lines* of the Lakes, will sail 1109 miles; and yet will average not more than 23 miles from shore, throughout the whole distance.

But the Coast Line of the Lakes on the American side is much longer, and excluding Green Bay and the North-west coast of Lake Michigan is for Lake Ontario 200 miles; Erie 370; Huron 440; Michigan 850; or a total of 1960 miles.

A very large proportion of the extensive commerce above set forth, is conducted by sail and steam vessels, at but a few miles distance from the American coasts of these lakes, and over a surface not exceeding an area of 7,000 square miles; more than 1,400 miles of this coast constitutes to the numerous vessels by which this commerce is carried on, a *Lee shore*, to the fear of which, vessels navigating those Lakes are constantly exposed.

No reference has been made to the Commerce and Navigation of Lake Superior from the want of satisfactory data. In 1855, however, the exports of Iron and Coppe alone from Lake Superior ports amounted to \$2,700,000.

The national importance of the Lake Commerce and Navigation is clearly set forth—first with reference to the population of the seven States bordering on these Lakes, and consequently interested in their Navigation and Commerce. Secondly, the position of those States, relatively to the great valley of the Mississippi River; and the extent and cost of their Railroads and lands, designed to open and facilitate commercial intercourse between the Atlantic Ocean, the Lakes and navigable waters and tributaries of the Mississippi River. Thirdly, the position of these seven Lake States, relatively to the British possessions and the Valley of the St. Lawrence River. Fourthly, the importance of the Commerce and Navigation of the Lakes, as a nursery of seamen from which the Navy of the United States may be supplied with the first class of seamen in the time of war, in which the tonnage of the Lakes is compared with the tonnage engaged in the Whale, Cod and Mackerel fisheries.

The White Population of the United States, according to the census of 1850, was

Showing that the white population of the seven Lake States is greater by 16,062 than the total white population of the remaining twenty-four States; and the difference has probably been still more increased since 1850.

The total value of foreign imports for 1855 in this region is \$274,403,935. If the seamen engaged in the Lake Navigation or in the fisheries are proportionate in number to the Tonnage engaged in each, then those engaged in the navigation of the Lakes must very considerably exceed those engaged in the Whale, Cod and Mackerel fisheries.

The amount of losses sustained by vessels and cargoes for want of suitable River and Harbor Improvements—number and kind of vessels sustaining losses on the Lakes by “shipwreck, stranding and collision,” from 1848 to 1855 inclusive, with the amount of damage sustained.

Whole number of disasters to vessels and cargoes, or either of them during these eight years, 2,117, of which 1,231 consist of shipwreck stranding and collision, a little over 4-0 of the whole, while the damage from these causes during the same period, was nearly 5-7 of the whole, and amounted to \$5,828,346; the total damage from disasters of all kinds being \$8,852,649.

We call especial attention to the last item.

The amount of duties collected in the 15 collection districts of the great Lakes from

1837 to 1855 was \$5,511,129 90, and the whole amount of appropriations that have been made to these Lakes from the beginning of the Government till now is \$2,884,125, showing that the United States have received from the Lake revenue \$2,267,004 98 more than it has given back to it in any shape. This balance will cover the amount expended on the Light Houses on the Lakes, with repairs, attendance of keepers and the cost of the Ship Canal around the St. Mary's Falls, and still leave \$1,000,000 for the U. S. Treasury.

We commend the foregoing valuable statistics to the attentive perusal of every man interested in our Lake Commerce.



RAILWAYS.



Michigan Central Rail Road.

This Line, which extends from Detroit to Chicago, in Illinois, is a route offering the traveler as much of the pleasant detail and picturesque variety of railway travel as may be experienced on any other western line. There is an efficient oversight of all employees in the several departments. The conductors are men of practiced skill, and it is an imperative condition that they are of steady habits. They are quick, unobtrusive, but firm in the discharge of their duties; and at none of the stations is the slightest indecorum tolerated. The whole line is laid with a heavy T rail, the distance being 282 miles. The several stations along the entire line are comfortably and substantially, though not with any expensive extravagance, provided with all desirable accommodation for the traveler, and for the security of the immense quantities of merchandise and farm produce, including large herds of neat cattle, and hogs that pass over the road to the large seaboard and intermediate cities or to cities of the still far off south-west and west.

This Company is now identified in interest with the Great Western Railroad, the western terminus of which is at Windsor, on the opposite bank of the Detroit River, the line then runs east to Niagara Falls, and necessarily, on meeting the diverging eastern lines divides passengers and freight amongst them to their respective eastern destinations on the extended shores of the Atlantic.

The Terms of Fare and Freight appear to be by no means exacting, but on the contrary the Company's business is conducted upon enlightened and liberal principles, which have obtained for the Company general approbation.

It would well repay the scientific traveling stranger to make personal examination of the gigantic establishments erected by this Company at both Detroit and Chicago. The traveler will pass through on this line the cities of Ypsilanti, pop. nearly 4,000; Ann Arbor, 6,000; Jackson, 5,000; Albion, nearly 3,000; Marshall, 4,000; Kalamazoo, 6,000; Niles, 4,000; and a great number of towns of minor importance, but all exhibiting a prosperous activity. For description of the cities named see "SUCCINCT GAZETTEER" appended.

For distances from Detroit and Chicago, as well as from each other of the places adverted to see "RAILROAD ROUTES" in Index.

Some idea of the immense magnitude of the great Central Passenger Depot of Chicago, erected jointly by the Illinois Central and Michigan Central Companies, may be obtained from the following description:

The building is of Illinois stone. The front on Water street is three stories high, wherein are commodiously arranged all the offices. It is a splendid piece of architecture. The entire length of the building is 504 feet, by 166 1-2 feet in width. The height of the main building is 84 feet. The roof is an arch, supporting itself with a

rise of 39 feet. The length of board one foot wide in the roof is 1,126 miles. Thirteen thousand six hundred and eighty-five pounds of iron rods were used in its construction. Length of rafters or chains, 5,280 feet; and 682,428 feet of tin plate was used in covering the roof.

Eight tracks are laid in the building. All trains out leave from the west side or nearest the street. All in trains arrive by the two outside tracks. The platforms between the tracks and on the sides of the building are wide and commodious. A very tastefully arranged baggage-room, one hundred and twenty feet long, is built on one of the platforms, with offices and rooms above for conductors, baggagemen, brakemen, &c.

The ticket office occupies a conspicuous place near the main entrance, in close proximity to both the ladies' and gentlemen's waiting-rooms, and directly over it will be the telegraph office of the companies—that governs the running of the trains.

The building is most admirably lighted, 2,687 feet of gas pipe being used in its arrangement.

The trains of the Illinois Central, Michigan Central, Chicago, Alton and St. Louis, and Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroads arrive and depart from this depot at present, making 34 trains daily arriving and departing.

It may be unnecessary to state, the fact is so evident that Michigan owes her unrivalled prosperity to her Railroads, as well as to the steam marine facilities of transport, which this line, as well as others, have had in their connection, whereby produce and merchandize are interchanged with the world at large, cheaply and expeditiously.

Regarding it as both appropriate, useful and interesting to the community, the following description of some of the new boats of the Company, which may be truly designated, FLOATING PALACES, is extracted from the Buffalo *Daily Republic*, and which, as the New York *Citizen*, edited by John McClenaghan, Esq., truthfully remarks, "presents a picture of splendor under Republican liberty which will be looked for in vain under the monarchies of the old world:"

"There is nothing, perhaps, that exhibits the magnificence and extent of our lake marine more than the splendid steamers that run daily to and from this city. For the first time we stepped aboard the "Plymouth Rock," one of the Michigan Central Railroad Line of Steamers, this morning. Having, like a very rural individual, *stopped up town* for the past two years, we were correspondingly surprised in examining this vessel, politely exhibited to us in all her parts, by Captain Ralph, the commander, and Mr. James Larkin, the polite, able and decidedly popular steward of the boat. The "Plymouth Rock" is three hundred and sixty feet in length, and has a tonnage of twenty-five hundred tons. Her grand cabin extends almost the entire length of the boat, and is furnished without regard to expense, with rosewood furniture, marble-topped, brocatelle, satin, plush, silk and embroidered easy chairs, ottomans, tete-e-tetes and divans; the floors are carpeted with the richest tapestry; the painting, woodwork, moulding and gilding are all that art can furnish or admire. The state rooms are not berths, but actual rooms fifteen feet deep, thoroughly lighted and ventilated, with rich carpets, marble-topped washstands and toilets, with water cold or hot, supplied from the engines; and to cap all—the most comfortable thing to a traveler—rosewood French bedsteads, low, wide, and roomy, draped with fine muslin printed hangings, and covered with finest Marseilles and linen bedding. Family rooms abound with all the above conveniences and luxuries, where the parents of a little troupe can have their children with them, and "companion rooms," where gentlemen traveling six or eight together, are accompanied with a large and roomy apartment.

On this deck also are the bathing departments, where warm, cold, or shower baths can be procured at a moments notice—a luxury indeed, to the tired traveler by sail. At the head of the grand cabin is the silver room, where some \$8,000 worth of magnificently designed silver ware may be seen, which, however, is but a small portion of what is for the boat. Everything about the cabin, or rather drawing-room, is arrang-

ed with the fullest view to light, beauty and convenience, and when lit up, is one of the most gorgeous scenes anywhere.

On the deck below is the ladies' cabin, with reception rooms, &c., connecting also, by a stairway, with the dining room, which is on the lower deck. The cabin is also fitted up with double rooms for the convenience of families or friends, and is marked with the same magnificence of furniture and adornment that distinguishes the immense cabin above.

The steward's department exhibits at a glance a scientific arrangement for convenience, and with its steam arrangements for heating its pastry, and substantial department; its crystal, glass, china and silver; its cleanliness, perfection and magnitude, was quite as interesting as anything we ever examined, and is entitled to a large share of the popularity which has been obtained by this line. This department throughout the vessel is under the sole and peculiar charge of MR. JAMES LARKIN, than whom no better steward ever traveled.

In every sleeping room there are life preservers for each inmate; and the precautions against accidents are so complete as to do away forever with the fear of accident in any shape. Seven fire engines of great power, with hose attached are constantly at hand and can be worked either by steam or hand within one minute from the moment of alarm. The usual number of life-boats are also attached. These precautions place the danger of accident of any character out of sight entirely.

We had almost forgotten to mention the bridal room, which is situated in the after upper cabin, which in point of splendor, puts anything we have ever seen to the blush. The sheets are of linen cambric, the quilt of embroidered straw colored moire antique; the sheets and pillow cases edged with point lace, and the bedsteads of rosewood, elaborately carved. The floor is covered with a pile of tapestry, while golden mirrors reflect, and reflect infinitely, the gorgeous furniture of the entire room, which is commodious, and of gold throughout. We advise every young man to look at it.

This boat is but one of three of the same size, the same tonnage, the same furnishing, and the same perfection throughout, belonging to this line, of which Mr. Charles E. Noble is the agent, than whom there is no more popular accommodating gentleman connected with steam or iron. The *Plymouth Rock* is commanded by Capt. P. J. Ralph, whose name is a recommendation for speed and safety. Her steward is Mr. James Larkin, who is as popular as he is widely known. Her clerk is Mr. John Evans, who is celebrated as such; and her engineer, Mr. John E. Edwards, perfect in his profession, and as solid as his machinery. We advise all those who wish to vary their railroad travel by water conveyance, to call upon Mr. Charles E. Noble, who will fit them out with accommodations fit for a king, on either the *Plymouth Rock*, the *Western World*, or the *Mississippi*."

The M. C. R. R. Company with its uniform liberality in immediately adopting all improvements in the experiences of lines of railway throughout the world, have erected a Telegraph Line along the entire length of the road. In fact, the running of all trains of the Line is now wholly directed by telegraphic orders. There are thirty offices between Detroit and Chicago, supplied with forty operators. There are night offices every thirty miles. Business hours of day offices from 7 30 A. M. to 8 P. M. Night offices kept open at all hours of the day and night.

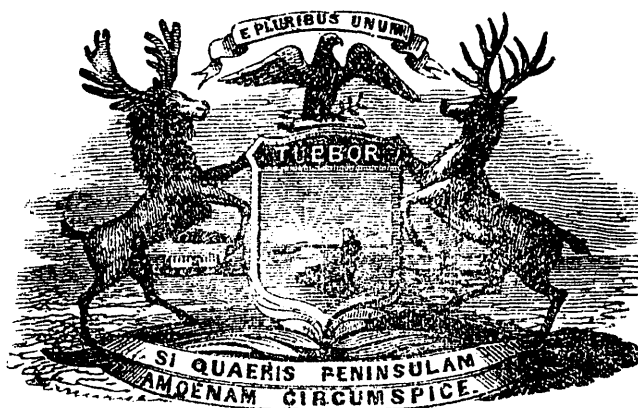

SUCCINCT GAZETTEER OF MICHIGAN.

Michigan is embraced between the parallels 41° and 57° North latitude, and between 82° and 90° West longitude. Its boundaries as established by act of Congress passed 15th June, 1836, defining the northern boundary of Ohio and admitting Michigan into the family of "States," are as follows :

"Beginning at the point where a line drawn direct from the southern extremity of Lake Michigan to the most northerly cape (called North cape) of Maumee (Miami) Bay, intersect the eastern boundary line of the state of Indiana, and running thence with the said line to the said most northerly cape of the Maumee Bay; and thence from the said North cape of the said bay, northeast to the boundary line between the United States and the province of Upper Canada in Lake Erie; thence with the said boundary line between the United States and Canada through the Detroit River, Lake Huron and Lake Superior to a point where the said line last touches Lake Superior (being the mouth of Pigeon river), thence, in a direct line through Lake Superior to the mouth of the Montreal river; thence, through the middle of the main channel of the said Montreal River, to the middle of the Lake of the Desert; thence in a direct line to the nearest head water of the Menominee River; thence through the middle of that fork of said River first touched by said line to the main channel of the same. to the centre of the most usual ship channel of the Green Bay of Lake Michigan; thence, through the centre of the most usual ship channel of said bay to the middle of Lake Michigan; thence, through the middle of Lake Michigan to the northern boundary of the State Indiana, at that line which was established by the act of Congress of the 19th of April, 1816; thence due east with the north boundary line of the said State of Indiana to the north-east corner thereof; and thence, south with east boundary line of Indiana to the place of beginning."

The extreme length of Michigan from the northwestern point, the mouth of the River Pigeon, to the south-eastern point, the northern cape of Miami Bay, is computed to be in a direct line, 540 miles. Its breadth is various. The Peninsular proper is 282 miles long, from north to south. Its breadth in the southern part, from east to west, is 170 miles. South of Saginaw 194 miles. Average breadth 140 miles. The upper Peninsula, from the extreme point east, at Point de Tour, to the extreme western point, the mouth of the Montreal, is 324 miles. Its breadth from north to south is 108 miles, and its minimum breadth is 60 miles.

It embraces within this area 56,243 miles, equal to 35,595,520 acres.

The male population, as appears by the State census of 1853, over 21 and under 45 years, capable of bearing arms in the military service of the State, amounted to 92,160.

Michigan contains forty-six counties at present. The quantity of territory not yet settled may make three times as many more,

The cities and towns of the State are described in the pages following :

The surface of the lower Peninsula embraces as much rich farming lands probably as any country of an equal area. It is rolling and diversified with limpid rivers and handsome lakes. It wants what the upper Peninsula possesses in superabundant measure and magnitude—some mountain scenery to gratify the hungry eye of the true lover of the beautiful. There are throughout the lower part of the State some handsome hills, which promise the picture of a good painter pleasing scenery. The lower Peninsula is well wooded and watered throughout, with occasionally extensive and more limited prairie openings. In this portion of the State there are several mines of iron, plaster and coal, the great value of which has begun to be appreciated.

This part of the State abounds also in game of every variety except the usually dreaded savage animals. It is genial to the successful growth of the grape if properly cultivated. Fruit trees of all kinds—except the tropical—produce abundantly the finest flavored fruits. It is rather thoroughly settled, the improvements made and cities and villages erected giving that encouragement to immigrants, which is speedily filling the State with settlers from abroad as well as from the eastern and middle States.

The Upper Peninsula of Michigan is a health-bracing and invigorating climate, the exceptions to settlement being cogent with the emigrant, that while lands are obtainable two or three hundred miles nearer market in the Lower Peninsula with more genial seasons and a shorter Winter why go settle so much more North?

The population comprised within the Lake Superior country consists mostly of miners, their officers and those who are maintained by mining operation. It is by no means of a tendency to encourage the more speedy development of the incalculable mineral wealth of the Upper Peninsular to discourage the settlement there of a permanent local population, who, becoming familiarized with the peculiar circumstances around them, would, as many sensible money making people do, determine to select their homestead there. Agriculture, although subordinate to mining employments, is still extensively attended to, and excellent crops of cereals and roots and other vegetables obtained.

The general government (during successive administrations) as well as the governments of the State seem to find general condemnation for not making appropriations to expedite winter inter-communication with this highly interesting northern outskirts of the Union.

White fish and trout are caught on the shores of Lake Superior in abundance; are cured and packed for eastern, southern and European markets. White fish are also caught in large quantities in the Detroit River.

The great features of attraction presented superficially by the Lake Superior country are its magnificent romantic bluffs, lashed by the Atlantic-like giant waves of the lake. And the living, bold, outstanding, labor-inviting mountains of unmanufactured money embraced in the almost pure metals of Iron Copper and Silver. Much to the damage of the iron mining interests of the country, the millions upon millions worth of iron employed in the erection of the Railroads of the Union has been imported.

It is but a question of time, however, to decide that none but American iron and copper shall be used in America.

Silver is also obtained in the upper Peninsula. The climate is the same as that of Montreal—clear sunny sky—but deep snow and freezing for almost six months. The snow may continue to fall during a day or two at a time, but giving generally the intervals of weeks and months of fine bracing weather.

The State government and legislature are recorded in another department of this work (see index) so are also the principal State Institutions. The assurance of its citizens cannot be pronounced ill-founded, when they aver that Michigan is destined to be the wealthier and more populous of surrounding sister States. She is indeed rather so at

present; capable of commanding almost any amount of loan in the market, but having a large unapplied surplus in her treasury, she moves forward independently.

This is the latest data; but it is very probable that the population of the State may be now near 700,000.

THE RIVERS AND LAKES OF MICHIGAN.

In introducing the Rivers and Lakes of Michigan to the notice of the local as well as traveling community, I wish to be instrumental in reviving an interest in a Gazetteer of the State of Michigan, published in 1837 by Mr. John T. Blois. Very few works of this character manifest more careful statistical industry; proving both the superior competency of Mr. Blois in its compilation, as well as the activity and zeal of the Topographical and other departments of the public service in deciding the various data which at so early a period in the settlement of the State, supplied Mr. Blois with the material necessary to construct a Gazetteer of Michigan, the usefulness of which is now, after a lapse of 27 years acknowledged by the community.

Making some modifications, necessary from the nature of advancing circumstances, in Mr. Blois' notice of the "Rivers and Lakes of Michigan," I extract largely in this article from his work, which merits a revision and reprint.

It is to be expected that from Surveys of these immense bodies of water, made from time to time by the Topographical Engineering Departments, the public will be furnished, at no remote period, with interesting developments. Several United States Engineering Officers are at present employed in the survey of the upper Lakes, under the command of Captain Macomb.

Rivers and Lakes.

The Rivers* of Michigan are, in general, comparatively smaller but more numerous, having in the peninsula, according to the volume of water, a greater length from their mouths to where they head, than is commonly observed in most other sections of the country. This latter circumstance may perhaps be attributable not only to the uniformity of descent, but to the more favorable structure of the interior to furnish them constant supplies. The Detroit, St. Clair, and St. Mary's are more properly *Straits*, and not rivers. They are tranquil, deep, copious and expansive streams, uniting the great lakes, the waters of which, they conduct toward the ocean. The largest rivers of the Peninsula are the Grand, Maskegon, St. Joseph and Kalamazoo, which flow into Lake Michigan; the Cheboigon and Thunder Bay River, that discharge into Lake Huron, and the Saginaw into Saginaw Bay. The streams flowing eastward are small, owing to the position of the dividing ridge, which is considerably east of the centre of the Peninsula. The largest are the Raisin, Huron, Rogue and Clinton. The largest rivers of the Upper Peninsula, are the Montreal, the Great Iron, the Ontonagon, Huron, St. Johns, and Chocolate, which put into Lake Superior; and the Mononomie and Monestee, which flow, the former into Green Bay, and the latter into Lake Michigan.

Michigan is encompassed by five lakes, four of which are the largest collections of fresh water on the globe. They are Lake Superior, Lake Michigan, Lake Huron, Lake St. Clair, and Lake Erie. These are connected by the Straits of Detroit, St. Clair, Mackinac, and St. Mary.

Of these immense Mediterranean waters, Lake Superior is by far the largest. It is situated between about latitude 46 deg. 20 min. and 48 deg. 58 min. N. and lon. 84 deg. 12 min. and 92 deg. 25 min. West. It lies directly north of the Upper Peninsula, and the greater part of its Southern coast is bordered by it. Its length is estimated at 500, its breadth in the widest part 190, and its circumference 1700 miles, (by some 350 long, and 1500 in circumference.) The coast, as well as the lake itself, is very irregular, exhibiting frequent indentations and bordered, especially in the N. W. with numerous small islands. The largest are Middle Island, and Isle Royal, near the

**Medicinal Waters* are known to exist in some parts of the State. These are mostly Chalybeate and Sulphur Springs, some of the latter, charged with sulphurated hydrogen, occur near Monroe, and Havre, and are useful in the treatment of cutaneous disorders. One near Havre is 35 feet deep and 150 in circumference, and produces a volume of water sufficient to propel a run of stones.

American coast, and Michippicotton near the northern part of the lake. Its tributaries are numerous, and many of them considerable streams, the greater portion of which put in from the American shore. St. Mary's Strait is the outlet that conducts its waters through a devious channel into Lake Huron.

Lake Michigan is the second in size. It is between lat. 41 deg. 38 min. 58 sec. and about 46 deg. N. and lon. about 84 deg. 40 min. and 87 deg. 8 min. W. It is a long and narrow lake, stretching a little northeastwardly between the Peninsula on the East and the State of Wisconsin and State of Illinois on the West. The northern part, together with the Straits of Mackinac separate the two Peninsulas of Michigan from each other. It is 330 miles in extreme length, and on an average, 60 broad, and distant 120 miles from the Mississippi. It contains, according to Hutchins, 16,981 square miles, or about 10,868,000 acres. It has many subsidiary streams both from the peninsula and Wisconsin. Its coast is generally sandy, but preserving great regularity. It is mostly free from islands except in the north, and in the Strait of Mackinac, which communicates with it and Lake Huron on the northern point of the Peninsula. There are only three bays of any importance. Green Bay, the largest, takes its name from the unusually dark green color of its waters. It lies on the N. W. and the great and little Traverse Bays on the north of the Peninsula.

Lake Huron is the third in point of size, and is situated on the northeastern border of the Peninsula, separating it from Upper Canada. It lies between lat. 43 deg. 5 min. and 46 deg. 12 min. N., and between lon. 79 deg. 50 min. and 84 deg. 30 min. W. Its length from north to south, is 260 miles, and coast wise on the south western shore 360. It is 160 miles in breadth from east to west, in the widest part, but exclusive of the Bay on the north east, it is only 90, and its circumference 1100 miles. Its area is 7,828 square miles, or 5,009,920 acres. The shape of this lake is extremely irregular. Its principal indentations are Saginaw Bay, which extends down into the Peninsula, and two others, one immediately north of the Manito Islands, and the other, south east of them. The latter, sometimes called the Manito Bay or Manito Lake, is very large, estimated at one-fourth of Lake Huron. Huron receives several considerable streams, but far less in number and amount than either of the two former lakes. The waters of this lake find an outlet in the Strait of St. Clair, which conducts them from its southern extremity into Lake St. Clair.

The next larger lake bordering this State is Lake Erie. Lake Erie extends from N. E. to S. W. between a peninsula of Upper Canada on the north, and New York, Pennsylvania, and Ohio on the south, and Michigan on its western border, between 41 deg. 30 min. and 42 deg. 55 min. N. lat. and from 78 deg. 35 min. to 83 deg. 20 min. W. lon. More than 30 miles of its coast border Michigan. The lake is estimated at 280 miles long, and from 10 to 63 in breadth, and 654 in circumference, containing 3,520 square miles, or 2,252,800 acres.* It has comparatively few tributary streams the largest of which is Maumee. It has its outlet on the north eastern extremity, through the Strait of Niagara, which conducts its waters into Lake Ontario.

Lake St. Clair is the smallest of the five lakes, bordering this State. It is situated on the east of the Peninsula, nearly midway between Huron and Erie, between about lat. 42 deg. 18 min. and 42 deg. 45 min. N. and lon. 82 deg. 23 min. and 82 deg. 46 min. west. Its greatest length from N. W. to S. E. is 30 miles, and greatest breadth 28, and 90 miles in circumference, containing about 127 square miles, or 81,500 acres. Its shape might be compared to the figure of a heart, but, unlike it, receiving its fluid at *one extremity*, from the Strait of St. Clair, through eight or ten large, beside numerous small channels, and discharging it at the *other extremity*, by the Strait of Detroit.

Interior Lakes.—Michigan seems truly to be a lake country. Not only surrounded, but the interior is interspersed with lakes from one border to the other. Of the unsurveyed part, there is less certainly, but in the southern half of the Peninsula, the

country is literally maculated with small lakes of every form and size, from an area of one, to one thousand acres, though as a general rule, they do not perhaps average five hundred acres in extent. They are sometimes so frequent, that several may be seen from the same position. Did they not possess so much beauty and so richly add to the picturesque and rural scenery of the country, there would be less propriety in bestowing upon them the dignified appellation of "*Lakes*," when a less elegant designation would be more appropriate to their extent. They are usually very deep, with gravelly bottoms, waters transparent and of a cool temperature, at all seasons. This latter fact is supposed to be in consequence of springs which furnish them constant supplies. They are the favorite resort of various kinds of aquatic fowls, and are supplied with an abundance of fish, of the varieties and sizes found in the great lakes; as the trout, bass, pickerel, pike, muskelungh, dace, perch, cat, sucker, bullhead, &c., &c., which often grow very large. It is usual to find some creek or rivulet originating in them, but what is a very singular fact, and not easily accounted for, many of these bodies of living water have no perceptible outlet, and yet are stored with fish. A lake of this description, with its rich stores of fish and game, forms no unenviable appendage to a farm, and is properly appreciated.

The northern and southern shores of Lake Superior are rocky, and in some places elevated. From Point Iroquois to the Pictured Rocks, it is sandy, then rocky to Fond du Lac, with occasional plains of sand, exhibiting the usual forest trees of those latitudes, as the pine, hemlock, birch, poplar, spruce, &c. There are several objects of curiosity on the southern shore, as the *Pictured Rock*, *Doric Rock*, *Cascade La Portaille*, &c.

The eastern coast of Lake Michigan is more regular, covered occasionally with pine and other evergreens, and extending sometimes, but rarely, several miles from the shore. The most prominent features are bluffs, rising often from one hundred to two hundred and fifty feet high. The "*Sleeping Bear*," is a noted curiosity of this kind.

The Peninsular coast of Lake Huron has generally high and gravelly banks, some of it rocky exhibiting frequently, primitive boulders of very large dimensions, especially north of Saginaw Bay. These may be seen likewise in great numbers at the bottom of the lake, at a great depth, near the coast. The Highlands of Sauble, which extend a considerable distance along and above Saginaw Bay, are seen from the lake, covered, like the coast, with firs and evergreens.

The southern shore of Lake Erie, in parts, presents a rock bound coast.

Wild fruits of different kinds are found on all these coasts. Juniper and strawberries, red and black sand cherries are found on the islands and shores of Lake Huron in the greatest abundance. The latter grow to the size of the common tame cherry, and have a sweet, delicious taste.

The rocky shores and uniform transparency of its waters, render it probable that the bottom of Lake Superior is of rock. From like indications, partial soundings, and other signs the same is inferred of Lake Huron. The bed of Lake Michigan is of both rock and sand. The foul, turbid state of Lake Erie, when ruffled by a gale of wind, is conclusive evidence of a muddy bottom, even where it is not proved by soundings. St. Mary's strait, and some parts of the strait of Detroit, have a rocky bottom.

The depths of Lakes Superior, Michigan and Huron, have been estimated at 300 fathoms, or 1,800 feet. Their depth below this is uncertain. A trial to this depth is said to have been made at the entrance of Saginaw Bay in Lake Huron, without reaching the bottom. No soundings have been found in either Huron or Michigan, 15 miles from shore. Lake Erie is comparatively shallow. The deepest water found in this lake is opposite and between Long Point and the town of Erie, Penn. Here the water has been found 60 fathoms, or 360 feet deep. The average depth of this lake is 25 or 30 fathoms, 150 to 180 feet. The average depth of Lake St. Clair is only 20 feet.

The *transparency, color and temperature* of the waters are somewhat remarkable. Their great transparency is universal ; in fact, it is, in a great measure, common to the waters of a large section of this north-western region, extending westward sufficiently far to include many of the subsidiary streams of the Upper Mississippi. Either the soil, from which these waters arise, or the waters themselves, possesses a defecating principle, by which they are purged of all extraneous matter. If they are rendered turbid by the occurrence of storms, or any other cause, they become perfectly pure by the intervention of a calm. Not so with the Mississippi. Whatever clarifying property may exist in any portion of her original waters, it loses its power when they come in contact with the turbid Missouri, and they roll on dark and thick, till they meet the gulf of Mexico.

Objects can be discerned from ten to fifteen feet below the surface. Huron is the most transparent, and it is said that, in a calm, a piece of white paper may be plainly seen upon the bottom, 100 feet below the surface.

A very agreeable scene is remarked to occur in some parts of this lake during a calm. The tranquil waters, at one view, appear like a vast transparent mirror, and at another, by a kind of optical deception, the vessel seems suspended, as it were, in the heavens, the objects on the surface are reflected, the depth is magnified, and the spectator is left to indulge in all the pleasing or sublime reveries his imagination can suggest.

The *temperature* of the deeper lakes is always cool. The heat of summer warms the surface, while a few feet below it is excessively cold. Lakes Huron and Superior are the coldest. A bottle sunk to the depth of a hundred feet, and filled, in mid-summer, feels, when brought in the surface, like ice water, and the water produces a like sensation to the teeth when drank.

The course of the *prevailing winds* varies according to the position of the lake. On Michigan and Huron, they are northerly and southerly, and on Erie, north-easterly and south-westerly ; the former prevailing in spring, and the latter in autumn. They generally blow lengthwise with the lakes, and are heaviest from the north.

The strait of St. Mary, to the falls, is the most difficult to navigate. Its common sailing channel is a perfect labyrinth, devious and circuitous, around islands and sunken rocks, passing cross channels and shoals. It is ascended by a southeast wind only, and then none but the most experienced can pilot a vessel either up or down it. The entrance to Green Bay through the Traverse Islands and the Strait of Mackinac is difficult to navigate without experienced pilots.

Lake Superior is reputed to be of dangerous navigation. Lake Huron, on the contrary, is not only the most safe, but likewise the most agreeable to sail, but from Mackinac, on the northern shore of the latter, as far as Cape Head, it is precarious and dangerous from the multitude of shoals, sunken rocks, or sunken islands, just under the surface of the water. There is a dangerous shoal eight miles northeast of Bois Blanc Island. The northern shore of Lake Erie is to be avoided. Long Point projecting from it is especially dangerous.

Of the other obstructions to navigating these waters may be ranked the *fogs*. These are of frequent occurrence in summer in the northern parts of Huron and Michigan, in Green Bay, St. Mary's Strait and Lake Superior, and are truly frightful to the mariner and canoe-man, and particularly so in the Strait and in the latter lake. These fogs are so dense as to obscure the nearest objects. They generally commence of a sudden, and often last three or four days, sometimes amid heaving billows and pointed breakers.

Fish.—The numbers, varieties, and excellent quality of the lake fish are worthy of notice. It is believed no fresh waters known can in any respect bear comparison. They are, with some exceptions, of the same kinds in all the lakes. Those found in Lake Superior and in the Strait of St. Mary are of the best quality, owing to the cooler temperature of the water. Their quantities are surprising, and apparently so inexhaustible, as to warrant the belief, that were a population of millions to inhabit the lake

shores, they would furnish an ample supply of this article of food, without any sensible diminution. There are several kinds found in Lake Superior, and some of the most delicious quality, that are not found in the lakes below, as the sisquoele and muckwaw, which grow to the weight of eight or ten pounds. The salmon and some others are found in Ontario, but not above the Falls of Niagara.

The following is a very partial list of a few of the prominent varieties. The sturgeon, white fish, Mackinac and salmon trout, muscalunjeh, pickerel, pike, perch, herring, white, black and rock bass, cat, pout, eel-pout, bull-head, roach, sun-fish, dace, sucker, carp, mullet, bill-fish, sword-fish, bull-fish, stone-carrier, sheep's-head, gar, &c.

The lamprey eel is found in all, but the common eel is found in neither of the lakes, nor in any of their tributaries except one.

The weight to which some of these attain is not exceeded by any other inland fresh waters, except the Mississippi.

The fish seems to be more numerous some years than others, and likewise of better quality. The kinds best for pickling and export are the white fish, Mackinac and salmon trout, sturgeon and pickerel. The fisheries at which these are caught are at Mackinac, at several points in each of the four straits, the southeast part of Lake Superior, at Saginaw Bay and Fort Gratiot. The mode of taking them is in seines and gill nets, and the trout with hooks.

Elevation of the Lakes.—The height of the Lakes above the ocean is ascertained to approximate exactness, only, where results have not proceeded from precise admeasurements. The following shows the fall from Lake Superior to the Atlantic.

Reckoning Lake Superior at 1,800 feet only, its bottom would be, at least, 1,176 feet below the tide water of the ocean.

Recession, fluxes, refluxes, &c.—There are signs existing in the vicinity of the lake shores, to warrant the belief that their waters once covered a much greater surface than they now do. These signs consist of ridges of various elevation, running parallel, but at various distances from the shore.

*Surveys of the Southern Railroad route show Lake Michigan to be 14 feet above Lake Erie.

- 194 DETROIT, Wayne County, pop 65,000; DETROIT may be regarded as one of the most favored of all the Western Cities of North America. The practiced judgement of the Exploring French Pioneers, consisting of Military men, Jesuit Priests and Fur Traders, selected its site in 1701, as a Military, Ecclesiastical and Fur Trading Post. The Fur Trade at this epoch was the most lucrative branch of commerce in the world, and it, without doubt, was the great moving cause of a good many of the western and northern settlements.
- Detroit changed its garrison and military government on the 29th of November, 1760, for a British Military commander and troops, and enduring under the latter regime, a series of Indian sieges, assaults and petty but vigilant and harrassing warfare, conducted against the English garrison by the celebrated Indian warrior, Pontiac. Detroit passed into the possession of the successful American Revolutionists; but on the 16th of August, 1812, it was rather precipitately surrendered by Gen. Hull, of the U. S. Army, to Gen. Brock, of the British. The views and hopes of the American leaders

not being cast in the same mould from which Gen. Hull's calibre of courage was received, the result of the war of 1812 having crowned with success (for all time it is hoped,) the arms of the young American Republic, Detroit was again restored her banner of the Union in 1813. The General Government at the same time, appointed as Governor of the Territory of Michigan, Gen. Cass who, throughout the final struggle, as well as in the earlier campaign of 1812, distinguished himself pre-eminently for zeal, activity, valor and professional ability in the army, as justly entitling him to that distinguished appointment; and which, with his subsequent political services in the Cabinet, as a diplomatist, and as a veteran Senator, (almost, it may be remarked, indispensable to the grave deliberations of Congress,) entitles his name to an imperishable record in the history of the Republic.

Detroit has improved and increased in the last twenty years to an astonishing magnitude. Now, as a beautiful, well-governed City of nearly 70,000 inhabitants, compared with the wretched Franco-Indian fur trading village of 1812, or even of 1835 or even, although much advanced, of 1840. Her increase in population and wealth is marvelous.

Thanks to the revolutionary restless spirit of the Oligarchial countries of Europe, which, while it may not remain there, to dethrone Monarchs by a *Coup de Main*, is as eventually and effectually removing the supports of their thrones, in driving forward to America with desirable haste, the millions of their peoples who have grown wise enough to value the incomparable Constitution and Governmental Institutions of her Republic.

In this regard, all the great Western cities, as well as the entire rural population, have equal cause of gratulation.

If Detroit increases in population in corresponding ratio, within a few years she will enjoy, with the increase of numbers, their enterprise and labor, their enriching productions and their many requirements; their aggregated virtues and their aggregated vices; a population of 100,000 inhabitants; and it is pleasing to observe that the men of the age are sufficiently impressed with this prospective view, and are marking on her map the lines of her future greatness.

There is a new and noble Custom House in progress of erection, the cost of which is not to exceed \$200,000; a new Post Office of similar magnitude; new State and County Buildings of a character suited to the advance of the age. Streets are being opened; Public Parks are being improved and new ones are being located.*

State Colleges and Primary School buildings are being erected with a view to the wants of future generations. A generous and wise liberality seems to influence the men selected by the masses to govern for the time; from which the inference is deducible, that at least the liberal teachings of our Republican creed, has impressed men with the true light of man's duty to posterity. "improve the present and bequeath the existing and increasing blessings of the present generation to the next, with the admonition that *they* 'do likewise.'"

Including the Great Western Railway, passing from Windsor, opposite Detroit, through Canada to the Falls of Niagara, there are three great trunk lines, concentrating in Detroit, and the judicious General Railroad Law of 1855, passed in the State Legislative Session, granted charters to several new and desirable line in progress of erection. Over the Detroit River, the great highway of Western Waters, are passing daily, the immense mineral products of the upper peninsula of Michigan [see index for statistics;] the agricultural produce and manufactures of the State, as well as foreign shipments of goods to an extent, which, appearing in a summary of figures, would seem incredible, [see shipping list.]

Manufacture of iron, copper, tin, in all their branches; in Cabinet Furniture and Upholstery, in Piano Forte and Melodeons, and every variety of Musical Instruments;

in Cutlery, Mathematical and Surgical Instruments; in Carriage, Wagon, Saddles and Harness; in Agricultural Implements; in Clothing, Boots and Shoes; in Marble Works and Works of Virtu; in Gold and Silver ware, and in Brass and Iron Founding; in Leather and Morocco are being carried on to an increasing extent.

Detroit is a large, and has all the means within reach, of being a vast emporium for Lumber of all descriptions. It is the accumulating depot of all the grain products of the State. Which latter, possesses milling capacities unsurpassed elsewhere. There is a large amount of beef and pork curing done for home and foreign consumption, and also immense quantities of white fish and trout are barreled for distant markets. On reference to the index of this work, it will be seen, the number of its Banks, its Markets, Public Halls and Buildings, Colleges, Schools, and neat architectural Churches and other Public Buildings.

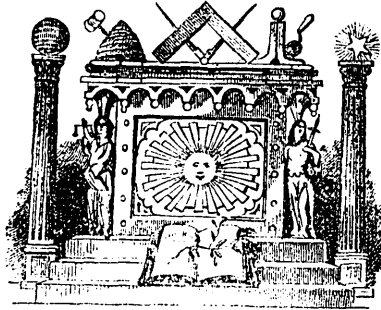

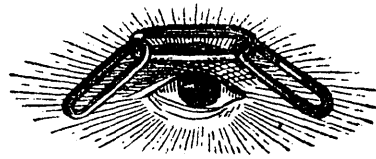

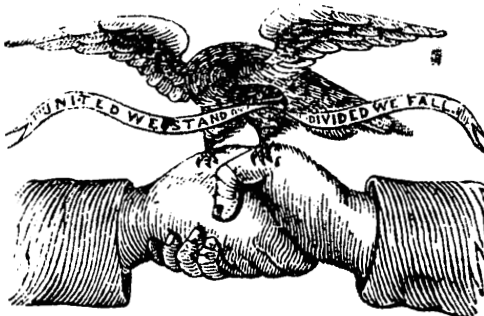

BRICK MANUFACTURE.—Probably three hundred and fifty millions of brick may be now annually manufac-
 tured in the yards on the suburbs of Detroit in all directions. The largest manufacturers are Mr Richard N.
 Hall and Mr. John Greusel, on the Chicago Road. Mr Greusel was the first to begin the manufacture of brick
 some twenty-five years ago, and was also the first to introduce machinery. The demand for brick is daily
 increasing with the increase of population and wealth of the inhabitants of Detroit. At the present time there
 may be 3,000 brick buildings in the city, and as fast as wooden buildings are removed, they are being replaced
 with brick. Mr. Hall and Mr. Greusel have got capacity to manufacture any amount of brick.

DETROIT COPPER SMELTING WORKS.—The Compiler of this Directory paid a visit to the Detroit Smelting Works the first week in August and found an extensive addition made to the original buildings. The works have now considerable capacity, having several furnaces, but they seem still to be much too small for the amount of stock on hand. There may have been a million dollars worth of copper in its rude state spread around upon the dock, and probably about fifty or sixty barrels of pure copper prepared ready for shipment east.

Some of the large masses lying upon the wharf were stamped as containing between 8,000 and 12,000 lbs, evidently from 90 to 95 per cent pure copper. These are noble specimens (square masses) of the Lake Superior Ores. The visit being unexpected, there was no opportunity of then obtaining any satisfactory statistical minutes of the operations carried on here—but evidence seemed sufficiently conclusive that two or three such establishments will not be too many at Detroit for the smelting of Lake Superior Ores. Located closer to Detroit City might probably be more advantageous, as labor could be obtained with greater facility.

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DETROIT CITY CEMETERIES.

Elmwood.

These grounds were selected with great propriety. They are naturally picturesque, but the Cemetery has become under the various artistic improvements and embellishments, a place desirable for the repose of the honored dead. There is no denominational distinction made in the sale of lots, but the rules of the Society, who laudably established the Elmwood Cemetery, are such as will always secure for it that propriety of monumental commemoration, which is in character with the advanced intelligence of the age. Elmwood is about 2 miles from the centre of the city, and well worthy a visit from stranger friends who sojourn for a little in Detroit. For a list of the controlling officers see Index.

Mount Elliott Cemetery.

This Cemetery, which is about three quarters of mile further than Elmwood, is also a neat and well arranged "Last Resting Place." It is the Catholic place of interment.

Several of the earlier burying places have been removed from necessity, to give place to the living generation to extend over them their stores and dwellings.

Lafayette Benevolent Association.

This laudible French benevolent Society, we are glad to find, is progressing, an increase of members being added at almost every meeting. This is one of the instrumentalities which ought to exist as an almoner of the benevolence of man to his brother man. We trust that such societies may always receive the appreciating aid of the wealthy, so that the duties of the good Samaritan may be dispensed in *deeds* as well as words of comfort. The officers of this Society will be seen on reference to the Index.

Michigan Coal.

We have been shown a sample of coal by Mr. Thurber, found within one hundred rods of the M. C. R. Depot at Jackson. The coal is light, clear and beautiful, and better than the majority of the coal used in this market. The stratum is from four to five feet in thickness, and was found by a collier from Ohio. When our Michigan coal beds shall be fairly opened they will afford coal as well adapted to general uses as any in the United States, and at cheaper rates than Ohio and Pennsylvania coals can be obtained.—*Detroit Advertiser.*

Franklin on the Copper Mines of Lake Superior.

It would seem from the following extract of a letter, dated May 1, 1829, from Saml. Preston, of Stockport, Pa., to the editor of the New York American, that the existence of copper in the regions of Lake Superior, was known earlier than it is generally supposed to have been, and that the United States are indebted for its possession to Dr. Franklin:

“Dr. Franklin told me that when he was drawing the treaty of peace with England in the City of Paris, he had access to the journals and charts of a corps of French engineers, that had sloops and were exploring Lake Superior, when Quebec fell to the British; from which chart he drew the line through Lake Superior to include the most and the best of the copper ore to the United States; that the time would come when drawing that line would be considered the greatest service he ever rendered his country, and the copper ore be a greater source of wealth than any other nation possessed; that the facilities of transportation would be well improved so as to export that copper ore to Europe cheaper than they raised it from their own mines.”

RECIPES.

Observations on making Puddings and Pancakes.—The outside of a boiled pudding often tastes disagreeable, which arises by the cloth not being nicely washed, and kept in a dry place. It should be dipped in boiling water, squeezed dry, and floured when going to be used. If bread, it should be tied loose; if batter, tight over. The water should boil quick when the pudding is put in; and it should be moved about for a minute, lest the ingredients should not mix. Batter pudding should be strained through a coarse sieve, when all is mixed; in others, the eggs separately. The pans and basins must be always buttered. A pan of cold water should be ready, and the pudding dipped in as soon as it comes out of the pot, and then it will not adhere to the cloth. Very good puddings may be made without eggs, but they must have as little milk as will mix, and must boil three or four hours. A few spoonfuls of fresh small beer, or one of yeast, will answer instead of eggs; or snow is an excellent substitute for eggs, either in puddings or pancakes. Two large spoonfuls will supply the place of one egg, and the article it is used in will be equally good. The yolks and whites beaten long and separately, make the article they are put into much lighter.

Tomato Omelet.—Procure two quarts of perfectly ripe and fresh tomatoes, cut them carefully, and simmer, for the space of two minutes, over a tolerably quick fire. Cut a few onions fine, and mix with them a due quantity of crumbled bread and a small lump of butter. When nearly done, beat up eight eggs, and mix them thoroughly with the mass by rapid stirring. In a few minutes, the dish will be done.

Soft Gingerbread.—Four tea-cups of flour, two cups of molasses, half a cup of butter, two cups of thick cream, three eggs, a table-spoonful of ginger, and the same of salaratus. Mix them all together, with the exception of the buttermilk, in which the salaratus must be dissolved, and then added to the rest. It must not stand long before being sent to bake.

Cure for the Croup.—Roast an onion, slice it, and press out the juice; mix this with honey or brown sugar, forming a syrup; give a teaspoonful every fifteen minutes till the child is relieved. This is a good remedy.

Ice Cream.—Any preserved fruit, five pounds; cream, one gallon; juice of six lemons; sugar to sweeten. Pass the whole through a sieve, then put it into the freezing-pot, and work it until frozen.

Scythes.—Workmen often make a complaint of their scythes not acting well, of the edge not cutting uniformly, and the form being wrong, &c. Now, the form best suited to each mower may be tested by a very simple experiment. Let a man, with a piece of chalk in his hand, walk up to a high wall or a barn door, and, raising it as high as he can, strike a curve from right to left; the line so traced is the exact form that his scythe should be; and if he applies the edge of it, and finds it to correspond, it will cut uniformly from point to heel, and save himself much trouble and labor.—*Scientific American.*

Feeding Poultry.—Mix with the food, egg shells and chalk, lime, lime mortar and all substances from which poultry may obtain the carbonate of lime which supplies material for the shell. Fowls may be fed with extravagant abundance and not lay eggs from the want of this ingredient in their food and will lay abundantly if it be well supplied.

Poultry Manure should be valued as guano. It is better by one thousand per cent. than the ordinary manures.

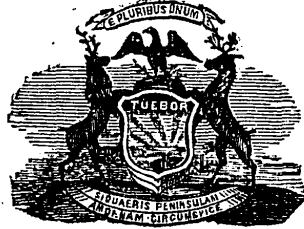
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IRON RESOURCES OF MICHIGAN.



The discovery of the Iron Mountains and Mines of Lake Superior was made in 1846, but owing to the cost of transshipment and transportation across the Portage at the Falls of St. Marie's river, but little was done to develop them until the completion of the Saut Ste Marie Ship Canal, two years ago, which gave a new and lively impetus to the business; and it now forms an important feature of the Lake Superior trade.

These mines are situated from three to sixteen miles from Marquette, a pleasant and thriving village of 1,000 inhabitants, overlooking Lake Superior, located near the mouth of Carp river, 140 miles above Saut Ste Marie.

The mine nearest to the Lake is the Eureka, about two and a half miles from Marquette. The ore here is not so easily or cheaply obtained as at the Sharon or Cleveland mountains, but it is of surpassing richness, and yields an iron of the finest and best quality for cutlery, &c. It has not been worked so extensively as the others, but is being prosecuted with vigor.

The Jackson Iron Mountain, owned by the Sharon Company, is situated 14 miles from Marquette; and the Cleveland Mountain, owned by Wm. H. Gordon and others, of Cleveland, is two miles beyond. A plank road, laid with flat iron rails, is in operation from Marquette to both of these mines, and the ore is transported in cars drawn by horses and mules. One span of horses or mules will draw a car containing five tons of ore, and make one trip a day. The operative forces at each of them the present season are about equal, and they send to Marquette an aggregate of from 800 to 1,000 tons per week. These mountains rise gradually to a height of six or seven hundred feet, and are a solid mass of iron ore, yielding from 50 to 60 per cent. of the best iron in the world.

Two and a half miles beyond the Cleveland, is the New England Iron Mountain, which is said to abound with ore of equal richness and quality with the others, but as the Railroad is not yet completed to it nothing has been done to develop it. A mile or two further on we reach the Burt Iron Mountain; but as they all bear so strong a resemblance to each other in the quantity, quality and richness of ores, a description of one answers for them all. That the iron of this region is inexhaustible, admits of no doubt, and that it is the richest and best in the world has been clearly proved by analysis and practical demonstration.

Heman B. Ely, Esq., and others, are constructing a substantial Railroad from Marquette to the Burt Mountain, and a Company have been formed to continue it on to the Wisconsin State line. Six or eight miles of this road are completed, laid with heavy T rail, and a locomotive is running upon it. The grading is nearly completed to the Jackson mountain, 14 miles, and the iron will be laid this fall, or early in the spring. The completion of this road will have a tendency to reduce materially the price of ore at Marquette. It is now held at \$5 per ton, delivered on the wharf; it can then be sold at \$3.50 and yield as fair a profit as it now does, at \$5.

The Sharon Iron Company have expended some \$300,000 in the construction of a substantial breakwater and wharf, twelve hundred feet long, at Marquette. The harbor is well protected, except against an east wind, which blows directly in; but an expenditure of fifty thousand dollars, in extending the breakwater already constructed, would make it safe at all times.

In 1848, two years after the discovery of iron, the first Bloom Forge on Lake Superior was built by the Jackson Iron Company. It is situated about ten miles from Marquette, in the vicinity of the Jackson Mountain. It is a small affair, having only two fires, and as the machinery proved imperfect, but little has been done with it.

The second forge was built by the Marquette Iron Company in 1850, located at the village of Marquette. This had four fires, and was worked by steam. It was in successful operation about eighteen months, when it was destroyed by fire, in 1852.

The third Bloomery was built, in 1853, by Mr. M'Connell. It is situated on the Dead River, six miles from Marquette, has two fires, and is worked by water power.

The fourth, and most extensive and successful Bloom Forge, on Lake Superior, is that of the Collins Iron Company, situated on Dead river, three miles from Marquette. This was completed in 1855. It is worked by water power, has eight fires, and is capable of manufacturing 2,000 tons of blooms per annum. C. A. Trowbridge, Esq., of Detroit, is the Managing Director of this Company, and the Bloomery is under the immediate charge of Robert J. Gravereat, Esq., of Marquette.

The Detroit and Lake Superior Iron Manufacturing Company, with a capital of \$100,000, has commenced the erection of a substantial Charcoal Blast Furnace in Hamtramck, a mile or two above the city of Detroit, which will be completed about the first of October. Its capacity will be about 2,500 tons of pig per annum.

But the most extensive Iron Works in Michigan are located at Wyandotte, a young and flourishing village on the Detroit river, ten miles below the city of Detroit. The Eureka Company has here, in full operation, a Charcoal Blast Furnace, capable of making 3,000 tons of pig iron per annum. It is supplied with ore from Lake Superior, which, being entirely free from sulphur or phosphorus, produces a quality of pig which has no superior in purity and strength.

The Wyandotte Rolling Mill Company have in operation a mill for

rolling Merchants' Bar Iron, which is capable of producing 3,000 tons of finished iron, of the very best quality, per annum. It cost \$75,000, and gives constant employment to over one hundred men.

The same Company have nearly completed, and which will go into immediate operation, a Mill for re-rolling and manufacturing Railroad Bars. The mill, which is 140 by 200 feet in size, cost \$80,000. It will be worked by two low pressure engines of 100 horse power each, give employment to three hundred men, and produce 12,000 tons of Railroad Bars per annum. These works are owned by E. B. Ward, U. Tracy Howe, S. M. Holmes, and others, of Detroit. GEORGE R. GIVAN, Esq., of Detroit, is the General Agent for all these works.

The Buffalo *Express*, of a late date, says that some of this (Lake Superior) iron was recently tested in Shepherd's Foundry in that city, with a view to try its tenacity. A piece of rolled iron, of the thickness of one's wrist, was subjected to various processes, and, after bending it across an anvil, twisting it in opposite directions, and, in fact, employing upon it all possible force and skill, the experimenters were compelled to acknowledge that they never before had known any iron capable of such stubborn resistance to breaking forces. The fracture of the pig metal glistens like steel, and the fibre of the rolled bars is tougher than that of any other iron known to the trade.

This iron is capable of being converted into steel of the finest and best quality, equal to any of the Swedes, English, Russia and Madras steel; and the Sharon Iron Company of Pennsylvania, who own the Sharon Iron Mountain, of Lake Superior, are making extensive preparations to manufacture all their iron, from that source, into steel.

As further evidence of the superiority of Lake Superior iron over all other kinds in use, we subjoin the following correspondence, showing an analysis of the ore by James R. Chilton, M.D., an eminent Chemist, of New York; the comparative strength of the iron, as shown by experiments of Professor Walter R. Johnson and Major Wade, U. S. Ordnance Department; and certificates of practical Iron Workers and others who have used it.

Each trace of the above samples was tested for phosphorus and sulphur, but without detecting any. Therefore, I know no reason why these Ores should not yield the very best quality of iron by the simplest modes of reduction.

The following abstract of analysis of various ores found in the vicinity of Marquette exhibits some curious figures which may be interesting. Single specimens of iron ore found within a mile or two of that town yield a larger per centage of metallic iron than the average from better known and more highly prized localities, while *picked* specimens from the mountains are richer than those near.

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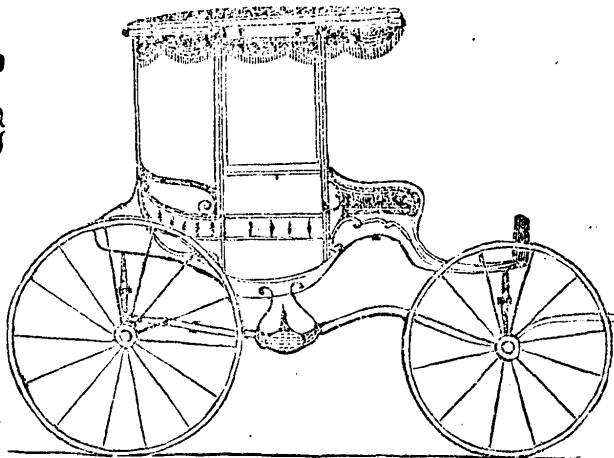
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
