Sporting Prowess of the Kimberley Jewish Community

When I asked you about the sporting prowess amongst our Kimberley folk, I expected to hear about a **golf** trophy or **cricket**ing runs and wickets. Maybe there would be some bowling glories as I know many of the Kimberley Jews played **bowls**. I did hear about all of those, but the arena widened – as did my eyes – to see such an array of sports in which Kimberley Jewish men (mainly men) and women had excelled – playing, coaching and umpiring for their **schools, universities**, provinces as **Griquas**, and even for the whole country as **Springboks**!

The sporting imagination and talent of Kimberley's sons and daughters from early childhood through to four score and over years, has known no bounds and ranged from diving in the deepest oceans to flying high in the sky.

There was **rugby**, **hockey** and **swimming**, but who would have guessed, our community produced such amazing sporting expertise as **Cyril Salkinder** achieving Griqua colours for no less than four sports: **Badminton**,

Archery, Weightlifting, and Practical Pistol Shooting. Cyril also competed in six Argus Cycle Tours and participated in Clay Pigeon Shooting and Bow Hunting – and he really enjoys hiking on the mountains in the Cape. Bernard Benjamin and his son Darryl Benjamin also excelled at weightlifting. Hilton Toube was a dab hand at Karate, diving and flying microlights. Jonty Sandler and Jeff Sussman excelled in equestrian events.

They started at an early age. In the pictures above and right we see two outstanding Kimberley boys – the Schrire brothers – Louis right 10 and his younger brother Velva 8. They are in their cricket togs in the 1920s. Both boys went on to be the Dux Medallists for all-round achievements at Boys High School, Louis in 1931 and Velva in 1933. They also both received a medal from the City Council (pictured) as the best matriculants. Louis later played cricket for UCT. He became a noted ophthalmologist in Kimberley and then Cape Town and Velva set up the cardiology unit at UCT/Groote Schuur that enabled Chris Barnard to undertake the first human heart transplants. Cricket and Golf:

Gus Haberfeld – cricket umpire



Did you know that Mayor of Kimberley and President of the Griqualand West Hebrew Congregation, **Gus Haberfeld,** born in Kimberley in 1904 was also a respected provincial cricket **umpire**?

He made history by lodging a query to



Wisden's about a rule, which they agreed to change. His daughter-in-law June Haberfeld has a 'special' inscribed cricket ball (above right) that was presented to Gus, to prove it. Gus's brother **Cyril Haberfeld** was a Griqualand West team **wicket keeper** who apparently, had several broken fingers to show for his efforts.

# Jack Frank – Cricket and Golf



Jack's proudest achievement was to have played first class cricket from 1925 to 1930. He represented Griqualand West as part of the Currie Cup team. In those davs it was a pow



days it was a powerhouse and included Springboks, Ken Viljoen and Ballie



Balaskas. Born in Kimberley 1905, Jack Frank was also a champion golfer. He was appointed captain of the Northern Cape Senior Golfers Association in 1965 and President in 67. From 1972 to 73 he was president of the Kimberley Golf Club. (He is pictured left in December 1939 with his new wife Hannah née Bergman).

### Noel Kretzmar – Golf



Talking of **Golf**, my father **Noel Kretzmar** (born in Lithuania 1899) clearly did well at golf in the 1930s. I have a newspaper cutting from the DFA (the local paper, the Diamond Fields Advertiser) of 10 August 1933, that has a headline under GOLF BATTLES: '**Dr N Kretzmar's net score of 64**'. With a subheading: 'Best Returned in Rhodes Competition.' It goes on to say: The weather conditions were ideal after many weekends of cold winds. **Dr N Kretzmar**, whose play has vastly improved during the past few weeks, returned a phenomenal net score of 64, probably the best net score ever returned in a Rhodes Competition.' Wow, I knew he had played a bit of golf – but not with such aplomb! With partner Dr A Hill, Noel went on to take the Thal prize as well.

Further down that same article in the women's section, I noticed that a certain **Miss A Kretzmar** (his younger sister) and **Miss B Bergman**, (soon to be his wife) tied for first place with another couple – who beat them in the playoff. All this shows a lot of activity on the links. He also used to go for early morning horse rides in his younger days and later early morning swims. He built the first home swimming pool in his back yard in Kimberley in 1950 or so. Read his story here Kretzmar, Noel

Hockey Rugby and Bowls

Abe and Violet Toube



Both Abe and Violet Toube (née Blumenthal) excelled at sport. Their daughter, **Daphne Gillis**, née Toube (born in Kimberley in 1932) wrote: 'My Mom **Violet**, born in Kimberley in c1910, played in a Griqua **hockey** team (I think as goalie) when she was still at school, playing against a visiting team from England. She also ran two South African Women's Hockey Tournaments in Kimberley, one in 1947 and the other in about 1962. She was a registered South African Women's hockey C Grade umpire. I also was a C Grade umpire. I won my accreditation in Rhodesia in 1953. (Read the Violet and Abe Toube family story here <u>Gillis (nee Toube), Daphne Rose</u>)

At the Kimberley reunion Zoom session in September 2021, someone mentioned that my dad **Abe Toube** had boarded with his mother in a house Transvaal Road. Also living there was **Norman Weinberg**, a recently qualified doctor. They played **rugby** together at that time, and also started courting the girls (Violet Blumenthal and Stella Davis) who became their wives. They remained lifelong friends.

(If you want to listen to the Zoom sessions, On 29 August 2021 at https://youtu.be/1Z4MKyB1x0M Natalie Sussman spoke about the early days of Zionism in Kimberley. There was passion and controversy, and it is interesting to know the story from someone who lived through it. (You can already read on our website about Jabotinsky's Visit to Kimberley in 1938.) Daphne Gillis – with her brother Trevor Toube kibitzing – spoke about the families who lived in Miner Crescent and Milner Street. Joy Capon showed us the little book she wrote about her parents, and spoke about her grandparents, specially interesting, because they came from the Greek Island of Salonica. On 5 September 2021 at https://youtu.be/463T7s9az84 we heard from David Levinsohn and David Friedman both born in 1935. You can read about David (Judge Friedman) and his family here: Friedman, Joe & Kate (nee Bergman) & son David.) **Daphne's brother, Trevor Toube** wrote: 'I have a photo of my mother in a **swimming** team. I don't recall ever seeing her in a bathing costume, so I guess she gave it up before I was born, (1939). It looks as if it might even have been a school team.

She also played **hockey** as Daph has said. She was certainly a hockey referee for most of my childhood, which means most weekends were taken. She pretty much ran Griqua women's hockey most of her life. When she wasn't the president or the treasurer or whatever, the holders of those offices used to come to Central Jewellers and say, 'Mrs Toube, how do we ...'

She, almost singlehandedly, ran the world women's hockey tournament held in Kimberley 1947 or 1948. I remember her being much amused by some of the English players who came to tea at our house and complimented her on 'the charming bungalow'. In Kimberley almost all houses were 'bungalows'!

My father **Abe Toube** (born in Kimberley in1896) played **rugby** when he was younger (and had a damaged cartilage in one knee to prove it). He told me that he'd played his last game in his 50's, in an 'old crocks' match – from which three players ended up in hospital with injuries. He was also a South African **athletics** track judge,

In later years he took up **golf.** He used to pick up **Phil Price** on Sunday mornings to go to the golf course. When he found



that game too strenuous, he switched to **bowls**. He won several trophies as well as, for some competitions, a chicken!.

Normally, the prize-winner would be given a chicken from the butcher, but because of kashrut they knew they had to give him a live chicken, which he then took to the shochet.

Though Daphne was a hockey umpire, neither she nor I inherited the sporting gene! Nor did either of my children nor any of my grandchildren.' Trevor <u>Toube, Trevor Philip</u>

Louis Toube and son Hilton Toube

Abe Toube's brother **Louis Toube** (born in Hopetown in 1901) was an outstanding sportsman excelling in a number of sports. He held the 100-yard dash record at Kimberley Boys High School as well as representing the first team at rugby and tennis. Louis remained a keen lawn bowler and was a member of the Beaconsfield Park Bowling club for many years.





Louis' son Hilton Toube



His most recent venture was in Microlighting. An intrepid engineer and adventurer Hilton gained his pilot's license and built his own microlight aircraft which he flew all over South Africa. (He shipped his microlight to Canada and had to complete ten hours flight time to maintain his pilot's license in Canada.) In Vancouver he was approached to manage the Musco Sports Lighting Hilton (born in Kimberley in 1949) excelled at **cricket** at Kimberley Boys High School. He was selected to play for the first XI from the age of about 14, he also became very involved in martial arts particularly **Karate**.

During his military service – in which he served in the navy, he represented the South African Defence Force Karate Team. He was based in Simonstown where he trained and spent the balance of his service in the SA Navy as a **diver**. He has been a keen **motorcyclist** since getting his motorcycle license in Kimberley in 1968 and has been riding motorcycles continuously since wherever he has lived in Kimberley, Bloemfontein, Israel, Johannesburg and Vancouver.

Bernard Benjamin and son Darryl Benjamin

Hellen Benjamin wrote: My husband, **Bernard** (b Kimberley 1938) and son **Darryl** (b Kimberley c1965) were too modest to write in, so I thought that I would pass on a bit of old sports news on their behalf.

Bernard was a weightlifting coach for many years in Kimberley and also coached Darryl, who got Griqua colours in 1978 at the age of 14. Bernard also got

Griqua colours for weightlifting and pistol shooting.

Darryl got **Western Province colours** when he was at university in Cape Town and got **Springbok** colours when he competed against Taiwan. Bernard got Springbok colours as a weightlifting coach and received the State President's award.

Cyril, born in Kimberley 1945 wrote: In response to your request regarding the sporting achievements of the Kimberley community, I would like to make mention of my sporting life in Kimberley, as follows

I was awarded provincial colours in the following sports.

- 1. Badminton
- 2. Weightlifting
- 3. Practical pistol shooting
- 4. Archery

I also competed in six **Argus Cycle Tours** (105km) and participated in **Clay Pigeon Shooting** and **Bow Hunting** – and I really enjoy **hiking on the mountains in the Cape**.

Cyril shares his most memorable highlights in his sporting career:

Badminton



In 1969 I competed in the **South African Games**, as a member of the Griqualand West badminton team.

In 1981 I represented South Africa for badminton at the **Maccabi games** in Israel. (In 1985 I was chosen again to play in the SA Maccabi veteran team, but due to business commitments I could not go.)



Archery

I was placed fifth in the SA championships held in Kimberley. In the World field archery championships held in Johannesburg, I was placed fifth in the amateur B class competition. (See me in my bow hunting gear - right)



Weightlifting

In 1973 I was placed third in the light-heavy weight division, at the South African Games held in Pretoria.



In the picture above, I am lifting for Griquas against the Orange Free State. I am glad to say that we won! You will soon be able to read Cyril Salkinder's story including his sporting career, his arms and ammunition business and his hikes in the mountains of the Cape on the website under families.

Bobby Benn – Hockey, Badminton and table tennis plus bowls and golf

Delia Benn wrote: My husband Bobby was also very involved in sport. He had Griqua colours for **hockey** and **badminton** and in 1960 won Griqualand West men's singles open **table tennis** championships.

Ivor Brown cricket and rugby - cricket and rugby member of the yacht club, hockey club and tennis club

At school Ivor played cricket and rugby with great determination. He also played tennis regularly, as well as squash. He continued to play sports after he returned to Kimberley, becoming a regular member of the yacht club, hockey club and tennis club.

He was also an enthusiastic bowler in his later years, both in Kimberley and Cape Town and became a regular member of the daily Sea Point beachfront walking scene.

Barney Cohen – Bowls

Brian Cohen <brianbcohen@icloud.com> wrote: I have my grandfather Barney Cohen's bowls, for some obscure reason. They are in a beautiful leather case with a silver monogram. I will take a photo and send on.

My older brother Raymond Cohen was a weightlifter too, Bernard Benjamin and Raymond were very close friends. Ray was an expert shooter too at the highest level. Ray was selected for the Maccabi games but for some reason did not go, this could have been weights or shooting. # National junior show jumping in city

SHOW jumping teams, complete with horses, arrived in Kimberley this week for the junior interprovincial show jumping championships to be held at the De Beers Stadium tomorrow.

The five teams competing in the event are Transvaal, Natal, Western Province, Eastern Cape and combined Orange Free State and Northern Cape. The competi-tion, which is being held for the first time in Kimberley, was intro-duced five years ago

first time in Kimberley, was intro-duced five years ago. Hosts of the championships are the Orange Free State and North-ern Cape team, whose members, all from the Kimberley Pony Club, were selected during trials last December. Mr. H. A. Nussey, secretary of the Kimberley Pony Club, has been busy organizing the pro-gramme since February to ensure that the competitions will run smoothly. smoothly.

The inter-provincial team cham-The inter-provincial team cham-pionships will commence to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Each team will be represented by four riders and the winners will carry away the Smith-Hillcoat Trophy. Western Province, that present holders of the trophy, have won the championships three times.

times. **PRELIMINARIES** The preliminary events, being held today and tomorrow morn-ing, are individual entry compe-titions. These include the Kimber-ley Pony Club's 1966 children's show which has drawn 42 entries from all over South Africa. Many members of the provincial teams will be competing in these events. All entrants are under 16 years of age and cash prizes have been sponsored for the competitions. The horses are divided into three categories governed by the height of the jumping obstacles. Maximum heights of the barriers are 3½t. for the J.C. group and 4t. for the J.B. and J.A. groups.

From 8 a.m. today there will be a full programme of events for individual competitors. He atended the Vryburg Junior School from 1945 to 1951 and was at K.H.S. from 1952 to 1956. He played tennis for the first team and captained the first hockey team. He gained the Field Marshal Smuts Award and won a Beit Scholarship.

From 1957 to 1960 he attended the University of Cape Town and obtained B.Sc. — Mathematics and Physics — and B.Sc. (Hons.) — Physics. He played for the first hockey team which he captained for two years. He also represented Western Province in 1959 and 1960.

In the following year he joined an international firm of computer and accounting machines manufacturers in Johannesburg. Here he played for Balfour Park and Southern Transvaal. He was also selected for the S.A. Invitation team to play the Swallows.

From 1962 to 1964 he played for Eastern Province and in 1963 played for a S.A. Invitation XI against De Batavieren.

In 1964 he was selected for the South African team to tour Britain.

He is branch manager of his firm in Port Elizabeth.

## Raymond Ellis – Cycling

Raymond Ellis, son of Edith and Sam Ellis was born in Kimberley in 1949. He was a brilliant

scholar at CBC. He worked in finance in Kimberley, Johannesburg, London and then eventually made his dream come true of making Aliya. He says I didn't feel at home in South Africa or England, but I have always felt at home in Israel. His years in Habonim in Kimberley (under Leon Chonin as a madrich) may have played a part). Raymond decided to take a break from the world of Economics and try some other professions. He said: 'I divided my day into three sections for ten years and took a job in Finance in the mornings, Social Work in the afternoons and Lecturing in Business English and General English in the evenings'. Raymond says, my 'curiosity, creativity and my imagination made it possible to have all these experiences'.

## Talking about cycling, Dennis Hammer writes:

~~~~~~~~~~~~~~

I thought I may as well tell you a bit about my Cycling Achievements! I was never that much of a sportsman. I was pretty average, perhaps less than average, while at Kimberley Boys High.

When I subsequently graduated from UCT in 1969 (Chem Eng), and started working, only later in 1983 at the age of 35, I heard about the Argus Cycle Tour (now the Cape Town

Cycle Tour, or the CTCT, over 109km around the Cape Peninsula, and which attracts up to 35000 participants) and was persuaded by a friend to enter the 1984 event. Riding a heavy Raleigh bike then, I finished in a very creditable time of 3hrs 41min, in a position of 375 out of 2023 finishers. In my third entry in 1986 I "broke" the holy grail time of 3 hours, finishing in 2hrs 52min, in 117th position out of 3086. I have since completed 37 consecutive Cycle Tours, with 10 of them being in 3 hours or less, and most in under 3hrs 20min. In 2013, in my then age category of 65 - 69, I finished 2nd out of 726, and in the latest (2021) event I was placed 7th out of 247 in the 70-74 aged category.

In the CTCT there used to be Team Events, and in 1991, I was in the MIXED TEAM EVENT (two men/two women), which we won as the team with the lowest aggregate time. I have the Certificate to show for it!

I have also completed 9 Double Century (200km) rides, with a best time of 7hrs 9min in 2019. See the photo of our 1999 team, with me third from the right. This is a 12-member team event where we all ride together, and finish together. I have also cycled from Port Elizabeth to Cape Town on two tours. This is over a distance of approx 800km in an organised Group, taking 5 days, but at a reasonable pace, and overnighting at stops along the way.

I still cycle regularly, averaging around 250 to 300km per week in summer.
