

Consecration of the Louis Isaacson HoD Lodge in Kimberley

22 November 1931

The consecration of the **Louis Isaacson Lodge no 29**, took place at the Synagogue Hall, Kimberley on 22 November 1931. There was a delegation of Grand Lodge Officers and Brethren to conduct the ceremony. They were cordially welcomed to Kimberley by the **Mayor, Mr Barney Cohen**, who spoke very eloquently and feelingly of the late Mr **Louis Isaacson**, after whom the Lodge is called. The Lodge began as a Benefit Society. Members paid a weekly contribution according to their age and means, which entitled them to medical assistance, sick and Shiva pay. On the death of a member the wife received a lump sum and the Lodge contributed to the erection of a tombstone.



The installing brethren were subsequently entertained by the local brethren of the newly consecrated Lodge to a ceremonial lunch at the **Savoy Hotel** where Bro. **Rev. M Konviser** proposed the toast of the Order, which had been in existence for 27 years, eloquently dwelling upon the spirit of **harmony, unity and fraternity**. There was much toasting and drinking to and fro between those in the new Kimberley Lodge and visiting brethren. **Harry Frank** the Vice president of the new lodge welcomed the visitors. Brother **I Rigel** of the Kimberley Lodge was the MC. He was reported as having made a delightful little speech. Brother **J Gorohovsky**, the secretary of the Kimberley Lodge spoke of the fine example of Louis Isaacson whose good deeds and nobleness they would aspire to emulate.

Rev M Konviser replied and spoke of the fine and untiring spirit of the young men of Kimberley and their ability to carry out all their tasks. The toast to kindred Institution was proposed by bro **Gus Habelfeld** the treasurer of the new Lodge.

During the Second World War many members enlisted, and the Lodge went into recess, until 1947 when was rededicated.
