Dear Kremenets district friends,

I'm pleased to report the completion of the <u>translation of the Kremenits</u>, <u>Vyshgorodek</u>, <u>un Potshayuv yizkor bukh</u> (Memorial book of Kremenets, Vyshgorodok, and Pochayev, 478 pages). Published in Buenos Aires in 1965 and edited by Falik Lerner, the original book is entirely in Yiddish except for a short introduction in Spanish.

Highlights of the book include the following:

- A history of the Kremenets area by Henekh Hoykhgelertner.
- Biographies of Jewish personalities in and from Kremenets
- Essays on life in Kremenets-district towns by emigres from Kremenets, Mizoch, Pochayev, and Vyshgorodok
- A detailed eyewitness account of the Shoah in Kremenets by survivor Betsalel Shvarts (An abridged account appears in Hebrew in the <u>Kremenets yizkor book published in Israel in 1954</u>. The longer Yiddish version closely follows the testimony Shvarts submitted to Yad Vashem.)
