Dear Kremenets district friends,

We are writing to tell you about recently posted datasets and translations and to invite you to our in person meeting at the 2024 International Association of Jewish Genealogy Societies conference.

We have recently posted these datasets and documents:

- **Hamburg, U.S., and Canadian passenger lists:** We have added more than 2,000 entries to our [Immigration-Emigration Master](#) file of people from Kremenets-district towns. The additions include entries from one new dataset (passengers departing from Hamburg, Germany) as well as entries for newly identified passengers arriving in the the ports of Baltimore, Boston, Galveston, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, and San Francisco, as well as Canada-U.S. border crossings and Brazil and Canada immigration cards. The earliest entries are for arrivals in 1885. This document is available on the [Kremenets KehilaLinks site](#).
- **1846 Jewish Building Owners, Radzivilov** (originally in Russian): This document is a translation of a list of 1,799 building owners and renters in Radzivilov. It includes the owner's surname, given name, and patronymic; the type and value of the building; and the size of the owner's family. Many thanks to Julia Maksimova for translating this document. The translation is available on the [KDRG Contributors Site](#).
- **Refinements to Family List (Posemeynyy Spisoki) translations, 1874-1899:** The Family List replaced the Revision Lists in 1858. It was compiled once and supplemented annually. Officials entered information by crossing out and adding. We have improved the format of the translation and added some recently discovered entries, bringing the total number of entries with names to 25,462. The translation is available on the [KDRG Contributors Site](#).

Unproofed records are available on the [KDRG Contributors Site](#) (for those who have donated money or services during the previous two years). Names and towns from all records are searchable in the [Kremenets Concordance Database Index](#). Searching the Concordance is free to all. If you find results that are relevant to your research, we will extract and send you up to 10 records free.

The Concordance now includes 518,303 name-town combinations extracted from documents and other sources relating to the Jews of the Kremenets district. Of the 1,971 towns mentioned, the most common are Kremenets, Vishnevet, Radzivilov, Shumsk, Katerburg, Yampol, Lanovtsy, Vyshgorodok, Belozirka, Ostrog, and Pochayev.

Our group will meet in person at the [44th IAJGS International Conference on Jewish Genealogy](#), August 18-22, 2024, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. We'll be in touch as soon as we know the exact date and time.

We wish you all a happy and meaningful Passover and thank those of you who have provided funding and services to support our work.
