There seems to be a Viking at the back, with horns – but who is he? The Jacobsons seem to be from the Punjab! (only Althea Kretzmar I believe is still alive in February 2021 just turned 96 in Cape Town)


Our website is gaining traction

Hi Geraldine,

I have read your work, *Alfred Beit: South Africa's Financial Genius* on the internet, as part of my research for a fictional story set in Hopetown between 1874-76. In addition to learning about this fascinating man, I found it very useful as background information on the diamond mining industry as a whole, and on the area around Kimberley.

My novel is self-published and is the fifth story of a series that I began called 'Brandy Row', set on Portland in 1830, and my characters have since travelled to both Australia and South Africa. This book is going to be called, *All that Glitters* and is due to be published in February, by Matador. I am printing only



500 copies and hope to make some of my money back by charging £9.99 per copy. (you can get it at Amazon)

Although I don't believe I have specifically quoted from your work, I wish to acknowledge you as a source of my research and to obtain copyright clearance. I have only recently discovered your home page, which also would have been useful information for my story, but the Publishers already have the manuscript. and the Museum and others to see how we can encourage more activity in this area, as Gavin says: 'As you can imagine, there are many towns and congregations who want their history to be recorded and kept alive. Losing friends - those who still have the memories

Sheila Grant

As Sheila Grant (who was in my class at school) said to me last year: 'I keep saying that the saddest thing about growing older is that there are so few people still around who share my memories. You are absolutely amazing and doing such a superb job of keeping the old Kimberley folks together and bringing our early memories to life, not to mention compiling a record of a once vibrant community for posterity.

Sheila said she had at last retired from work in early 2020 and so she was hoping to share some input on our various records, 'if not in the next couple of weeks, then while I am away visiting my daughter and her family in New Zealand from mid-February to late May. (Well that proved a longer visit than she intended – but she was happy to be there and have quality time in the Pandemic)

Leon Chonin, in writing his Jewish Education in Kimberley article, had asked Sheila whether there had been an honours board at Girl's High School listing Dux Medallists. She said 'I don't know if there is an honours board but will try to find out. I do recall that most of the Jewish girls did pretty well at school. I know that **Brenda Frank** (maybe 1962) won the Dux Medal in her year, and I did in 1956, but was not aware that **Josie Shapiro** did so. My mother used to tell me that **Ashne Shapiro** (neé Kretzmar) had also won the Dux Medal. I am not certain whether there were others who won this award or any sports awards. Anita Kaplan may have done so'. If any reader of this paragraph knows of any Jewish girl dux medallists, please let me know.

Sheila wrote the amazing story of the **Frank Family in Kimberley**. she said: Someone once remarked to me that almost every Jewish family in Kimberley was somehow connected to the Frank family, and I do believe this is true.

Sheila went on: Originally the Frank family were called Podlifsky. They came from Slutzk, Belarus. The Patriarch, Ephroim Boruch (Bernard) Podlifsky, whose surname was later somehow changed to 'Frank', married a Miss Borodach (I think her name may have been "Minya") and they had three children, Judel, Annie and Israel. The family moved to America, where Minya sadly died. Ephroim Boruch returned to Slutzk where he married his late wife's sister, Stishie (Stella) with whom he had four more children, Solly, Rachael (Ray), Jack and Cyril (the youngest three being the same ages as his eldest son Judel's children Minnie, Nappy and Masel. In September 2020, Sheila was turning her attention to her mother's family, the Cohens.- Barney and Bertha. She wrote: I found the piece on Uncle Cecil (Cohen)'s wartime exploits most interesting. I knew he had served 'up North' but didn't have much in the way of details. Uncle Eric was Barney and Bertha Cohen's youngest son. They had six children - Frances Kryn (who was mayoress when Barney was Mayor of Kimberley), Harold (who had 3 children - Doreen, Valerie and Douglas), Cecil, Ruth Broude (Barbara's mother), Eric (who later changed his surname to "Conlyn"), and Anita Frank (my mother). As Uncle Harold's first wife died very young, and his second wife did not welcome the children, Douglas says he knows nothing about his father's wartime history, but I have an idea he did serve in some capacity. I have copied Douglas into this e-mail. Uncle Eric was a pilot in the RAF for the duration of the war and flew many missions. I am trying to contact his one remaining son, Trevor, who would probably have more information on Eric.

At that time, in September Sheila wrote: I am still in New Zealand, where most things are open and doing well (except that my daughter, Lauren, who is a Travel Consultant, has lost her job, like so many in that industry. Also, Tourism is a very important part of the economy in this beautiful country, and of course there are no tourists coming into the country. nor any locals going overseas. The North Island has a few Covid cases, mostly brought from abroad by returning citizens, here on the South Island there are no active cases. There are very few Jews in



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Queenstown and no structured community or Shul, but we had 37 people for dinner on First Night Rosh Hashanah (apart from the 14 who were unable to make it!). I am, in no hurry to return to SA where the situation is bad, and in any event, there are no flights yet.

How ironic, that an over 80-year-old, safe in New Zealand from the dreaded Covid-19, raging in South Africa, should suddenly pass away. Our condolences to the family especially her daughter Lauren and Son Barry. We are all so grateful for Sheila's precious memories which she has been able to put down so succinctly and which are hopefully on the website for ever.

My cousin Alma Steinberg, née Frank and also Sheila's cousin - who grew up in Kimberley, lived in Johannesburg until her husband Arnold passed away, and now lives in New Zealand to be near her son Mark and Mandi, and family sent this picture above. Alma said: I heard the sad news about Sheila It came as a shock to me as I had spent time with her only 2 months before. At the end of October I went away with Mark, Mandi and the kids for a long weekend to Queenstown on the South Island where Sheila was staying with her daughter, Lauren and family. Mark and Mandi had already met Lauren through mutual friends in Auckland.

I did not know Sheila very well in Kimberley and it was lovely to meet her. She is such a sweet and kind person. We had a couple of meals together with both our families. I also spent a day on my own with Sheila while the children went bicycle riding. She was enjoying her time with her daughter and was in no hurry to get back to Cape Town. We were all very upset to hear about her sudden death.

The picture was taken at a restaurant where we went to celebrate Mandi's birthday on the evening before we left. From the left, going round the table are Sheilas's granddaughter Madison, sext to Alma's Granddaughter Mika. Sheila is sitting at the far end of the table next to Alma. Then almas Grandson David, Mandy and Mark, then Sheila's daughter Lauren sitting next to husband David (who is probably taking the picture.)

Hilda Movsas (nee Silkiner)

Hilda passed away on 6 February 2021 in Jerusalem aged 89. She was born in Kimberley in 1931, the older daughter of Sonia and Wolf Silkiner. Though her parents lived in Johannesburg Hilda was brought up in Kimberley by her uncles Solly, Ivan, Beady and Barney Diamond, and her aunt, Ray Diamond. Hilda went to Girls High School where she made firm friends with Daphne Toube Rina Cvy and Joy Goldman. She left Kimberley after gaining her Matric to live with her parents and sister Shirley in Johannesburg. She completed her BA at Wits University, qualified as a librarian, and worked at the University Library, and Wits Medical Library. She married Israel Movsas, who was a General Practitioner in Brakpan. They went to live in London, where her husband specialised in Radiology. When they returned to SA they lived in Durban, where Hilda worked as a librarian in the Killie Campbell Library. In 1995, they emigrated to Israel, to live in Jerusalem. She is survived by her three sons, six grandchildren, and two great grandchildren. Once more, condolences.
