This Newsletter, the 65th includes some exciting new discoveries about Kimberley's Jewish history that I made on a recent trip to South Africa – in January 2025, after 13 years.



I did not actually visit Kimberley as sadly there is nothing left for me there. And having the virtual



cemetery that I can visit any time I want to, is a boon. And in any case more meaningful and beautiful memorial memories for me are visiting places where I used to spend time with my family, such as Muizenberg Beach, African Markets and Chapman's Peak coastal drive, that I managed to do thanks to my cousin David (also born in Kimberley).





Kimberley Community at the South African Jewish Archives


I was pleased to find some material on the Kimberley community that I had not previously known when I visited Beyachad to see the South African Board of Deputies Archive.

The Very First Shul

There was a sketch of a Yom Kippur service in the Kimberley synagogue in 1881.

This showed the only image I have ever seen of the first synagogue built in 1876 – which we understood was a corrugated iron and wooden structure much too small for the over 1000 Jewish males in Kimberley at the time. (It was superseded in 1902 by the opulent Memorial Road Synagogue – which is still in use today).

This sketch (see below) shows a vast interior and drawings of the minister, Rev Meyer Mendelssohn and the other dignitaries at the time: Mr LH Lyons the president, Mr JP Saber, vice president, Mr J Crewell treasurer and Mr J Alexander the Secretary. These are not names I recognise as the early synagogue books and papers are lost – given to the war effort in the 1940s. However, on a tablet in the Memorial Road Synagogue in 1908 erected 'in grateful recognition for zealous services rendered to the 'Glory of God and to the benefit if Jewish Institutions in Kimberley', the name of Joseph Saber is there amongst other past presidents: Louis Goldsmith, Flavian E Lazard, Isaac Stone and Abraham Greenberg. (I don't know anything about these people.)



The letter below, describes the Yom Kippur service in Kimberley in 1881 with a densely packed synagogue and the temperature on 4 October of 103 degrees in the shade! It says that 'business


was at a standstill as the diamond market was deserted, showing how strong a hold the Jewish people have succeeded in establishing in Kimberley.'

Opening ceremony of the Memorial Road Synagogue - September 1902

I also found a copy of the opening ceremony of the Memorial Road Synagogue on 14 September 1902. It was built on land and with money donated by De Beers – with whom many of the 'machers' were connected. Building began as soon as the Siege of Kimberley was over, while the Boer War was still raging and the military had to approve all the building materials. Gustave Bonas who was the President of the Congregation and who had masterminded the whole process was Chair of the Building committee and was to open the synagogue. Rev Harris Isaacs was to 'solemnise the ceremony'.



Centenary of the community 1973

In 1973 the community held a large civic gathering at the William Humphries Art Gallery to celebrate the centenary of the community – established in 1873 just six years after diamonds were first discovered in a piece of dry barren veld.

In 1983 there was another Bat Mitzvah ceremony conducted by the Coppermans. Mrs Copperman taught the girls, and Rev Copperman conducted the service. The girls in question were Justine Benn, Marie Rohloff, Debbie Datnow, Jenny Haberfeld, Sharla Cohen, Lorin Bayer and Marilyn Cohen. I wonder if this was the last such ceremony in Kimberley?
