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Dear Friends

I hope you are keeping well and safe and also sane – as some of us dive into a second wave of coronavirus infection, and others may be coming out of it.

How did you spend the High Holydays 2020?

It would be interesting to know how you celebrated (or not) Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur in these strange times. What did your synagogue (if you have one) decide to do? And how did it work out? It would indeed be fascinating to hear your experiences, and we can share them in the next Newsletter.

This year I have tuned in to my own synagogue – Belsize Square Synagogue, London, which was open for a restricted small number of congregants. Our services are always live-streamed and archived so one can always tune in whenever you want and from wherever you are. It is an independent synagogue created in 1939 by Jewish refugees from Germany and Austria. The service is based on the German 'Liberale' tradition, which is quite close to orthodox but with the rich Sulzer and Lewandowsky music, sung with choir and a small organ. This is what it looked like this year. The Rabbi and Cantor sat behind plastic screens and wore masks when they were not speaking or singing! In their archives, you can still see their services and even hear my granddaughter Daisy chanting her Maftir and Haftorah for the Shabbat Naso in June. <u>http://www.synagogue.org.uk/services/live/</u>



Of course, this year, as we were 'voting with our fingertips', there was plenty of choice on offer. One was able to be a part of 24 hours of Yom Kippur services livestreamed from Australia to California.

I enjoyed a service from the

Central Synagogue - in New York. They have a most inspiring half Chinese rabbi Angela Buchdahl and great cantors Dan Mutlu and Julia Cadrain. If you prefer the orthodox style, I loved a beautiful 'Taste of Yom Kippur' from the Gates of Heaven Synagogue, **Shaar Hashomayim, in Montrea**l. This synagogue was inaugurated in 1859 as a synagogue of English, German and Polish Jews. They wanted their services to be like those in the great synagogue Duke's Place in London. I also listened to an excellent Sermon and music from the **Stephen Wise Temple in Los Angeles** <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5LxymVLkQqE.</u> Interestingly, the President of this huge Hollywood congregation spoke with a South African accent – and I heard the same accent from speakers at other synagogues too. We do get everywhere!

Many communities have put a huge amount of thought and effort into these on-line offerings and provided the highest quality of presentation (specially those in California, who have film people in their communities). Many services included women cantors, who are beautiful, and their voices carry deep emotion.

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Kimberley Jews in the Second World War



Our Kimberley 'boys' did not talk much about their war experiences. But thanks to all the families that have remembered their few words and found evocative pictures, I have been able to put together, with some extra research, quite a comprehensive story of what it must have been like for Kimberley families in those war years between 1939 and 1945.

Before we post it on the website, please look at the full document (attached) to see that I have accurately observed or interpreted what you have sent me. Also, see if you can identify any other people in any of the pictures. Please open the attachment to see it.

I have certainly learned a lot through compiling this article. I have added some information about where and when the battles that our young men had to contend with took place. I have also written about how South Africa entered the War in the first place – as it was touch and go – and on which side!! I am in awe of the brave men and women who lived through it all. Looking at war documentaries of battles in the Western Desert and Italy recently, we get some insight into how horrendous an experience was. As Natalie Sussman said. 'There is no glory in war'.

We must surely feel grateful that our boys helped to liberate Europe, and who knows where else, from the scourge of Hitler. It's amazing to read their stories – some of which contain some really heartrending stuff, and some have some unexpected humour.

Kimberley's Jewish contribution:



Of the fifty Kimberley Jewish men who volunteered for active service (and thankfully all came home alive) we have so far, received thirty-six stories, some just a few lines and some a couple of pages, about how they fared. They are listed in alphabetical order below. When you have looked at what we have written in the document, and it has then all been corrected – I will try to add page numbers for ease of future reference and publish this article on the website.

Above we see Ivor Haas, left, then someone unidentified, next Harry Klein and Charlie Hotz. I don't have any information about Harry or Charlie's time in the army. And I still need information on the service stories of Jack Frank, Jules Katz, Goldie Mehl and Poddy Shein. Also there are approximately ten others that we have not yet discovered. After this last round of additions and corrections, that I will make if you write to me straight away, the article will be posted on the website. If you do have information you would like to add to this saga, this is a good time to do it.

The participants that we have heard about are categorised below in this table under Airforce, Navy, Army and Medical Corps, and their rank (where I can ascertain that). Please check if this information is correct – here and in the whole article, which is attached.

Apter, Mendel



This story has pictures of Mendel and Winnie and their family and another lovely story written by Hector Kleinot. This one is called '**Drambuie does not taste good a second time'**. It is about the time Mendel invited Hector to help him clear his famous Bar at his house in Memorial Road, before Mendel and Winnie left Kimberley for Johannesburg. Hector wrote it as a sort of eulogy for the man he loved and respected. He sent it to the family after Mendel had sadly died of lung cancer, at a young age, soon after leaving Kimberley

Berman (nee Brown), Cherille

Cherille has updated the questionnaire she originally filled in, with a full story. It includes lovely family pictures and memories of her time in Kimberley. The picture of Cherille's wedding, in 1972, is the first picture of a wedding in colour! Since we first posted this story, almost the whole of Louis and Connie David's son Bobby's family has been in touch. Rick David in San Francisco, Lorraine and Bobby's second (of four) sons, has collected and sent pictures and stories of the family over many years. These include of eldest son Anthony, who sadly passed away in 2000 at 47. We see the swimming pool at 65 Carrington Road, where Lorraine had her swimming school. We also see the beautiful Villas on the Costa del Sol in Spain which Aubrey David, architect and younger son of Louis and Connie, designed and built, arguably starting the trend for British people to live in Spain for part of the year

Diamond Family

This story of the Diamond Family, the six siblings: Sonia, Ray, Saul (Solly), Barney, Aaron (Beady) and Ivan, was supplied by Sonia's daughter Shirley Talerman – née Silkiner. There is also a tribute to Beady and Flo's daughter, Sandy Diamond who passed away nearly two years ago. New on that page, send by his son David Diamond, is an article and a picture from the DFA of **Beady Diamond and the famous Dobbin** – the iconic horse that always stood at Kimberley Saddlery. This was in the paper in 1964, at the time when Beady finally sold his business. There is also the



picture of Beady on the shul committee at the inauguration of Rabbi Werner in 1957. Werner was our second longest serving Rabbi, from 1957 to 1970. We have now identified all but one (in the front row) of the committee lined up for this special occasion. Goldberg, Abe



Abe was the eldest son of Deborah and Solomon Goldberg who ran a dairy in Kimberley. Abe excelled at CBC and went to UCT to become a doctor. His army service is fully described as well as his later adventures in farming and his many other exploits. He had a full life until 99 years old. Hertog, Lucien

Lucien Hertog was a part of three prominent Kimberley families (Hertog, Harris and Cohen). His mother, Lilly, née Cohen from Port Elizabeth, was the sister of amazing Gussie Sussman - see Sussman, Philip and Augusta (nee Cohen). Lucien was adopted by Lilly's second husband Charles Edward Hertog, who was the legal advisor to De Beers. Charles was a widower – his first wife had been Elise Harris, who had also died. She was the daughter of diamond pioneer, magnate and distinguished soldier, Colonel Sir David Harris. Another sister of Lilly's was Gladys whose husband, Mr Rosenstrauch was in the diamond business. They were parents of twin sons Henry and Andrew and a daughter Eva Rosenstrauch. (We would love to have more information on this family for our Kimberley website.) The picture is of Lucien trooping the colours of the Kimberley Regiment.

Lewis, Coleman and Family

Coleman Lewis married Fanny, the younger sister of the well-respected Dr Solomon Zweiback (1882 – 1943). Cole Lewis' grandson, Raymond Lewis, has sent a great story

about his grandparents, and about his father and uncle who went to CBC in Kimberley and became well known doctors in the UK after the war. He also writes about Dr Zweiback on the same page <u>Zweiback</u>, <u>Solomon</u> (Interesting to me was that the name of the young Rabbi at the Stephen Wise Temple in Los Angeles that I listened to on Yom Kippur, and



who gave an excellent sermon, is Yossie Zweiback. I wonder if he is related to our Dr Solomon?)

Odes, Solly, Sheila and Family



We were delighted to hear from the Odes children in Canada. Solly was a real war hero and won the Military Medal for Bravery. They sent a loving story about Solly in the war and about Solly and Shela's life in Kimberley and in Canada. Here is their gorgeous picture of Solly and Sheila.
