Message from Chief Rabbi, Dr. Warren Goldstein

Returning to our spiritual home

When the first Jews arrived in SA in the 1800's, one of their main priorities was to establish shuls.

The first congregation was founded in 1841 in Cape Town, when 17 men gathered on Kol Nidrei night to form a minyan at the home of Benjamin Norden in Hof Street - a site that would later become the Mount Nelson Hotel. The first shul building was inaugurated eight years later in The Gardens.

In Johannesburg, the first recorded *minyan* took place in the store of a "Mr Weinstein" on the corner of Mark and Harrison Streets. It wasn't long before the President Street Shul was built in 1888 - Johannesburg's first shul and one of the young city's first brick buildings.

The Jews who founded these shuls were refugees from the poverty, hardship and oppression of eastern Europe, struggling to find their way in a new country. Wherever they went, across the length and breadth of the country, they set up shuls to gather as a community, to pray to G-d, learn Torah, and to be connected to the Divine heritage of the generations of Jews that had come before them.

We, South African Jews, the descendants of the brave pioneer who started our first congregations, have inherited their passion for shuls. Our shuls are places where we all feel we belong. We feel at home. We feel welcome no matter our background. We feel Jewish, we feel connected to community, we feel connected to Hashem. We love to come and feel part of a community where we find friends who become like family.

This commitment to shuls goes back to the very beginnings of Jewish history. One of the first instructions the Jewish people received from G-d, while we were still in the desert, was to construct history's very first shul: the



Mishkan, the holy "Sanctuary", the place where G-ds presence was felt almost intensely, the place the Jewish people gathered together to connect to G-d in an intimate way. The Mishkan was a forerunner to the Beit HaMikdash - the holy Temple in Jerusalem - and forms the prototype for our shuls throughout history.

According to the Talmud (Megillah 29a), even after the destruction of Temple, G-d's presence the continues to dwell in the shuls we build, which our sages calla "miniature sanctuary". Our shuls, so permeated with sanctity even amidst the darkness of exile, are a microcosm of the Mishkan and the Temple. They are places of innate holiness of spiritual connectedness - where we can access G-d and be uplifted by its holy atmosphere.

At shul, we feel a deep sense of belonging. We form bonds of love and connection with each other and feel held by a sense of community. We feel G-d's presence intensely and we nourish the roots of our Divine values that form the essence of our Jewish identity, and keep us strong in a turbulent, confusing world. At shul, we find solace and tranquillity, where we can regroup, refocusing on what's important and doing so together as families and as a community. When we gather together in our shuls, prayer becomes a communal experience not a lonely, isolated one - a way of transcending our own narrow interests, praying for the good of whole, summoning our collective merits as a community and as a people, even as we come

before G-d in humble submission.

As the South African Jewish community, we recognise these truths. We feel them deeply. We experience weekly daily, how our shuls enrich us spiritually, emotionally and socially. We go to shul to connect with Hashem. We go to shul to connect with each other. We go to shul to find faith and strength, community and partnership, vision and inspiration.

And that is why these past six months have been so tough for us. One of the most difficult aspects of the pandemic is that we haven't been able to go to shul - and we've been bereft without them. This absence has deepened for us how truly precious our shuls are to us. We could never have imagined a scenario where all our shuls would be closed. And yet that is what happened. This traumatic experience has made us appreciate even more what our shuls mean to us.

Now, thank G-d - with our commitment to implementing comprehensive safety protocols - our shuls are open to us once more. And just in time. Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, in particular, is a time that we all feel the importance of being connected to our shuls and our congregations.

This Rosh Hashana, let us recommit as a community and as individuals to our shuls. Let each of us think about what we can do in the new year ahead to strengthen and deepen our connection to our shuls and each other. Let us each contribute our unique energy, giving what we can give and doing what we can do to ensure our shuls' ongoing vibrancy and sustainability.

And, in turn, let us draw strength and inspiration from our shuls as we end a difficult 5780 on a more hopeful note, and pray for a better 5781.

May each of us and all of us together find favour before our Creator, and may G-d inscribe us all for a sweet new year - a year of health and healing.

As I looked back at my message from last year, I could not help but be stunned by its prescience for the coming year. Essentially, its theme was "why sweat the small stuff"? Why worry about the trivialities of life, when we could focus on the truly important?

In writing that, I could not have imagined a year such as the one we have just endured. Who would have imagined that just a year later, the world would be in unprecedented turmoil?

Economies are struggling the world over, political structures are being eroded and safety and stability is wobbling, even the most advanced democracies. We watched descend America into lawlessness, so much so that our Bochrim, who left the country just prior to lockdown, are yearning to return to the





Over Board

The potential for abuse by the media is aptly illustrated by the way it treats those whom it regards as "the enemy". Those unfortunate enough to be branded as such should brace themselves for a rocky ride where truth is treated with total disdain and lies are all too often elevated to the level of indisputable fact.

The freedom of the media to manipulate the news or convey a particular message to the public depends entirely on gaining the trust of the reader, knowing that the vast majority of readers dig no deeper than the opinion of the journalist doing the reporting. Generally, the message is accepted without much (if any) question.

Although readers are told that they have recourse to a mysterious-sounding Ombudsman if they feel that the news service has failed to live up to its obligation for accurate reporting, I have yet to come across any individual who has resorted to this service. No doubt it does happen.

With the steady demise of print media (newspapers and magazines) as more and more people rely on radio and TV news for their information, a quick reference for the latest news has become even easier to acquire but also more difficult to challenge.

At the very least, one could submit a letter to the editor of a newspaper questioning the accuracy of a report, with no guarantee of one's letter being published.

Having served as a member of the Zionist Federation Media Team for twelve years, I can vouch for the fact that no more than 20% of the letters submitted ever see the light of day.

Considering the time and effort devoted to compiling a letter, which all-too-often requires extensive research, this is hardly encouraging.

To further complicate matters, as Jews we face yet an added problem, if we happen to be Zionists and supporters of Israel and are identified as such. This affiliation, I would say, applies to the majority of South African Jewry with historic links to the Jewish state.

Clearly, the general public know little about Jewish history in general, much less the history of Israel. What they might be aware of is attributed to articles and news reports provided by the media. Even the Holocaust is a vague concept for most, contrary to our naïve belief that so enormous an event

cannot possibly pass unnoticed. Sadly, this is not the case. With each passing generation, it comes closer to establishing its place as no more than a footnote in history, despite the commendable efforts of those dedicated to keeping its memory alive. This is borne out by the lack of conviction when faced with the immortal words, "Never Again!"

The indifference of all forms of the media to "Jewish news" has resulted in the categorisation of the press and even TV channels into either Left or Right wing adherents. Those on the Left are regarded as "liberal" while those on the Right are regarded as "conservative". From there the definitions become far more intricate and cover a wide spectrum of sub-divisions. Suffice to say, the two categories could not be further apart in their ideologies and beliefs.

This provides an ideal platform for the two camps to continually "have a go" at one another and one of the clearest examples is the open warfare waged by CNN against American President, Donald Trump. Against this, Fox News, being a largely conservative channel, holds the President in high esteem and is generally unstinting in its support.

Others on the "Left" are The Guardian, The Independent, The Statesman, the New York Times, The LA Times, plus many more, while The Wall Street Journal stands firmly on the side of conservatism. In Israel itself, Ha'aretz could not be further to the "Left", so much so, that it's a wonder that some of its journalists have not been charged with treason.

So serious is the continual, vicious onslaught by the media against Israel (surpassed only by the United Nations), that at least three independent media "watchdogs" came into being which not only monitor most of the world's press daily (including radio and TV stations), but unhesitatingly challenge fake news, false claims and the manipulation of illustrations that often accompany articles.

These are "Honest Reporting", which operates from Israel, "Camera" which is UK based and PMW (Palestine Media Watch) also based in Israel. All do incredible work in exposing lies and misinformation about Israel, sometimes accidental but all too often deliberate.

Regularly, when it comes to Israel, the press require monitoring of a kind foreign to other countries.

Our magazine keeps us all connected as a community and we are extremely grateful for the kind donations and subscriptions received from our readers who support our Chronicle with their contributions.

As a guideline, we request an average of R250.00 per annum. We have proudly maintained very high standards and have every intention of continuing to do so. If you paid your subscription last year, this is the time to repeat that generosity. If you have never paid it before, it is not too late to start!

"In current stressed circumstances, the need is great and with strained resources it is easy to say no. But we always try to find ways and means to say YES", said Ciska Lewis. "We regard this as our core mission as Pretoria's Women of Action"

Other projects in the past month included delivering parcels for children at the Sunnyside Methodist Church and delivery to Baraka Hospital and the Bramley Children's Home of food parcels, accompanied by a general donation of knitted blankets, hoodies, teddies and jerseys from the Embassy of Israel.

Katarinka

While still in Russia, under the constant threat of communist oppression, which saw the death of many and the outlawing of Jewish Torah observance in many ways, the previous Lubavitcher Rebbe recounted the following story.

A common form of income in those days was making concerts for the public. These were not regular concerts, but rather a form of one man band. There was a music box called a Katerinka. Someone would wind the wheel and the music would play. Naturally, the faster the person wound, the faster the tempo of the music.

To ensure a faster more energetic tempo, the katarinka operator had a side kick. A hapless youngster who had a single drum which he would beat to set the faster pace. As he beat the drum he would shout "freilicher, freilicher, freilicher" more joyous, more joyous.

The owner of the katarinka would give the side-kick a stipend for services rendered. Bereft of a home, a family or any other source of income, the young drummer was totally dependant on the owner of the katarinka.

On one occasion, the drummer was distracted. He was off beat, and his tempo lacked the speed for jolly music.

Frustrated, the operator of the katarinka gave the drummer a smack on the cheek in front of all the spectators.

The poor drummer was deeply hurt and humiliated. But what was he to do? Without the katarinka operator he would have no means to feed himself and no means to sleep in some form of shelter. Saddened and depressed, the drummer had no choice but to continue apace, drumming away and shouting, "freilicher, freilicher, freilicher".

At the conclusion of the Chassidic gathering, the farbrengen, the Chassidim sat around analysing the profundity and message of the story.

How are we to understand the character and actions of the drummer? Given the dejected feelings


of the drummer, it must be that his call to joy of "freilicher freilicher", was not his true essence but rather a show. His true essence was sadness and dejection.

However, upon deeper reflection that is not the case. To be sure, the drummer is sad at present. This is as a consequence of the smack he had just received. Yet with time, as the pain, both physical and emotional dissipates, his true being, his essential expression of joy, will be the only lasting aspect of his character. After all, his very existence, his livelihood and sustenance, his safety and security, his home and his hope, all rest in his single mission, of calling "freilicher freilicher", of setting the pace of joy.

Friends, this is our reality. We too feel like we have been given a smack. Shuls remain closed, and we remain separated from friends and family. Our job, however, remains the same. To beat the drum of "freilicher freilicher". To maintain our joy even during these difficult times.

And when the pain of the "smack" has left, we will remain true to our essence of joy, happiness and exuberance for the gift of life.

Letter from 33 Ben Yehuda

How quickly one settles down in Israel. It feels like home. Living during the Corona era here has not had much impact on us as we are presently not working and are mostly at home. We walk or catch busses, usually half full and easy to keep social distancing. Every day, the beaches are packed. It is mid-summer and the weather is warm and humid. It troubles us that so many people are unemployed and hotels are deserted. A partial reopening is expected soon. The sidewalk cafes are thinly frequented. No tourists are to be seen. The usually bustling and jam-packed Carmel market is easily navigable due to the small stream of shoppers.

We have finished our Zoom ulpan. Israelis are adaptable but critical. They are up-in-arms about how the lockdown was handled, as well as the corruption of Netanyahu's government. Sounds familiar dosen't it? Daily demonstrations have taken place outside the Prime Minister's residence and in Tel Aviv.

Seeking an apartment is a challenge. The best ones are furnished to cater for tourists while our container with our household goods, lies waiting.

We have been restricted in our social activities but have made contact with various ex-Pretorians, most of whom live in Ra'anana. Hadassa is continuing with medical ulpan studies and I am looking for work opportunities, not necessarily in law. There is undoubtedly an ageist culture in the

Israeli workplace. Employers are reluctant to take a work seeker above the age of 65. Despite a start-up mentality for which Israel is famous, it lags behind contemporary trends of flexible employ-ment.

While speaking of lagging behind, it must be noted that while data costs are low, there is no extensive fibre rollout for internet which is somewhat hard to believe in such a high-tech society. Another area which is surprisingly lacking is banking. Internet banking is available but somewhat daunting when the instructions are in Hebrew. These are the challenges of an oleh. Another challenge is shopping and identifying products on the shelves in the supermarket. It is made somewhat easier with Google Translate, being an essential app.

Shabbat is a joy, even in secular Tel Aviv. Shops start closing mid-afternoon and the traffic and noise in Ben Yehuda Street abates. There are a couple of shuls nearby which are open. Everyone exchanges 'Shabbat Shalom' greetings. A feeling of relaxation and peace prevails.

Our utmost admiration to the community of Pretoria for your strength and commitment in keeping Jewish life alive and caring for those who are in need.

Honey In, Honey Out,

A person came past the Rebbe and said that he had heard there is a Segula (a good omen) for peace in the home. Every Motzei Shabbat, the husband is to fold his Tallit (which is prohibited on Shabbat) along the creases and that will ensure a peaceful week in the home. The Rebbe responded "I don't know about that, but doing the dishes certainly helps."

We live in a time transfixed by Segulos. The latest fad is the baking of Shabbos Challah, and separating the Challah beforehand. It is a Segula for all things needed, from speedy recovery from ill health, to shidduchim. Challah bakes are the Segula rage.

To be sure, it's a wonderful thing. There is nothing more pleasant than coming home to the smell of freshly baked Challah, as well as the majesty of performing this wonderful Mitzvah. However, sometimes we get so caught up in the Segulas, we forget the basics.

In a similar vein, we have all the wonderful Simanim or symbols that are customary to be eaten on Rosh Hashana. From the apple in honey for a sweet year, to the pomegranate that our Mitzvot should be plentiful like the seeds of a pomegranate.

Yet sometimes we become so particular about the Simanim, that we act in conflict with those very simanim.

Take for example the apple in honey, symbolising our prayer for a sweet year. While we are particular about eating this symbolic food, we pay little attention to the bitter words which regularly come out of our mouths. How can we expect a sweet year when our very words are dripping with vinegar whenever we speak to someone?

We eat the pomegranate hoping to be filled with Mitzvot, yet choose to refrain from engaging in more mitzvot than we have previously done.

The symbols are there, not instead of our actions, but rather motivators and encouragers of such action.

So when we eat the apple in honey, apart from the Yehi Ratzon we say, we should add "honey, (term of endearment for one's wife especially if her name eludes you) thank you for setting such a wonderful Yom Tov table with such wonderful food.

When honey not only enters our mouths, but comes out as well, you would be amazed at how sweet a year you will in fact have.

Remember, doing the dishes helps more than folding a thousand Talleisim.

Wishing you a wonderful Shabbos and a sweet, healthy and happy new year.

We do not need what we think we do

G-d forbid we should run out of toilet paper after buying the 40 tins of baked beans. Looking back now, we barely touched the baked beans and will not have to buy toilet paper until the year 2025. Minimalism is good!

We are not in control

If anything, 2020 taught us all a lesson in humility. The virus did not discriminate against social, financial or intellectual status and we found ourselves vulnerable and fearful. When faced with tragedy, the playing field becomes level and the pain of loss is the same for everyone. Let us show each other the same consideration and respect in the year to come.

Salachti 5780. Thank you for the lesson.

Welcome 5781, let us do things differently this year.



Question of the Week:

I think I'm too sloppy for organised religion. I try to keep Shabbos, but often make a mistake and turn on a light. I do have a kosher home, but the amount of times I've accidentally put the milk spoon into the meat pot is embarrassing. I read the prayers but my Hebrew is so bad even G-d must have trouble understanding me. I'm not perfect and never will be. So why bother striving for perfection if I know I'll never get there?

Answer:

You are right. You should not strive for perfection. It's not the Jewish way. Improvement? Yes. But perfection? No.

I learnt this truth many years ago. I was just eighteen, studying in a Yeshiva in Israel along with several hundred other students from around the world. I hadn't been there long, but was quickly swept up in the atmosphere of intense Torah study and idealistic spiritual growth. I was loving it.

But then, one morning, a mini-crisis happened. Just after prayers, one of my friends came over to me with a concerned look on his face.

"I think your Tefillin may not be kosher," he told me. (Tefillin are phylacteries. I don't know what phylacteries are.) I asked him what he meant, and he pointed out to me that my head Tefillin didn't look perfectly square. It seemed that one of the corners was not an exact right angle.

This was serious. The hand-made leather boxes of the Tefillin are supposed to be square. If they aren't square, then they aren't Tefillin. They aren't even phylacteries. If my friend was right, if my Tefillin were slightly off, then I hadn't been wearing kosher Tefillin for years. I had been putting on unsquare unkosher Tefillin every day, which is as good as not putting Tefillin on at all. I knew what I needed to do. I needed my head Tefillin examined. I rushed straight away to an expert in Jewish law. He was a senior rabbi who was famous for his decisive and clear judgments. I brought him my Tefillin and showed him the imperfect corner, fearfully awaiting his verdict.

The rabbi inspected the Tefillin, looked at me with his kind and wise eyes and smiled. He responded with one line, a quote from the Talmud: "The Torah wasn't given to angels."

immediately understood what he meant. My Tefillin were just fine. When the Torah says to make your Tefillin square, it means you should make them as square as is humanly possible. We aren't perfect angels, and we can't make perfect angles. We are humans who can only do our best. That is exactly what G-d requires from us

If G-d wanted perfection, He would not have created us fallible humans. But He did create us, so perfection is obviously not what He wants. He wants us humans, not in spite of our sloppiness, but because of it. Perfection G-d has already. Imperfection on the other hand only we can give Him, when we dedicate our imperfect lives to His service.

Our squares won't be perfect squares, and our angles won't be exactly right. Humans make mistakes and sometimes get it wrong. But that's alright. We are not angels. We are not expected to be.

G-d wants your sloppy Shabbos. He wants your messy kosher kitchen. And He loves your attempt at Hebrew prayers. Doing your best, as imperfect as it may be, is perfectly human.



Overcoming the Covid-19 pandemic could be just one of many positive results of Israel and the United Arab Emirates establishing full diplomatic relations on August 13, 2020. This is the greatest advancement toward peace between Israel and the Arab world in the last 26 years, marking the third formal peace between Israel and an Arab nation, after Egypt (1979) and Jordan (1994).

The historic pact is expected to trigger numerous joint projects in health, economics, agriculture, water technology, telecommunications, security, culture, tourism and other fields.




Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu announced the US-brokered Abraham Accord with Abu Dhabi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Zayed Al Nahyan ("MBZ"). Even before the accord, on July 3, Rafael Advanced Defense Systems and Israel Aerospace Industries of Israel signed agreements with Abu Dhabi's Group 42 concerning R&D collaborations for solutions to SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19. On August 15, UAE company APEX National Investment signed a strategic commercial agreement with Israel's TeraGroup to develop SARS-CoV-2 research. Netanyahu said the two technologically advanced countries will open mutual embassies and direct flights, among other bilateral agreements. Under-the-radar business and security ties have been building over the past 20 years, and diplomatic ties more recently.

Fast on the heels of the agreement Haifa-based Pluristem Therapeutics signed a non-binding memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Abu Dhabi Stem Cells Center to advance cell therapies for diseases including Covid-19.

"The aim of the collaboration is to capitalize on each company's respective areas of expertise in cell therapies to deliver regenerative medicine for the benefit not only of the citizens of the UAE and Israel, but for humanity as a whole. This is not the first Covid-related project between the two countries.

Leora is a South African who attended Seminary in NY. She has five years teaching


experience and is looking forward to Ganeinu reopening where she will be teaching Jewish Studies.


